A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA REQUESTING ASSIGNMENT OF AN INTERIM COMMITTEE TO EVALUATE MONTANA'S JUDICIAL DISTRICT BOUNDARIES, NUMBER OF JUDGES, AND COURT SUPPORT SERVICES.

WHEREAS, there is a continuing need to evaluate the geographic composition of the state's judicial system, the number of judges in that system, and the support personnel and technology that may be used to properly support the system; and

WHEREAS, in 1975 and 1976 an interim committee of the legislature struggled with the organization and staffing of the judiciary; and

WHEREAS, that committee stated in its report that the efficiency and manpower requirements of the courts could not be adequately assessed because of the lack of available data at that time; and

WHEREAS, due, in part, to that committee's concerns, the Court Administrator has collected considerable data that is available now for the consideration of a planning group; and

WHEREAS. the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court has suggested that it would be timely for a planning group to meet to develop recommendations for judicial districting and support.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

- (1) That an interim committee be assigned to evaluate possible changes in the boundaries of Montana's judicial districts, the number of district judges, and the support personnel and applied technology necessary to properly execute the judicial function of the state of Montana.
- 13 (2) That the interim committee sit with six persons
  14 appointed by the Supreme Court as a District Court Planning
  15 Committee to pursue its assignment.
- (3) That the Planning Committee report its findingsand submit its recommendations to the 47th Legislature.

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
