4 A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT TO MINIMIZE 5 TRANSMISSION OF RABIES BY PROHIBITING THE POSSESSION OF 6 BATS, SKUNKS, FOXES, RACCOONS, OR ANY OTHER WILD ANIMAL 7 SPECIES KNOWN TO BE CAPABLE OF TRANSMITTING RABIES TO HUMAN 8 BEINGS."

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10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

Section 1. Definitions. Unless the context requires
 otherwise, in this chapter the following definitions apply:
 (1) "Department" means the department of health and
 environmental sciences provided for in Title 2, chapter 15,
 part 21.

16 (2) "Person" means an individual, group of
 17 individuals, partnership, corporation, firm, or association.

18 (3) "Wild animal" means a skunk, fox, raccoon, bat, or
19 any other species of wild animal known to be capable of
20 transmitting rabies, as determined by the department through
21 rules made pursuant to [this act].

22 Section 2. Prohibition of possession of wild animals 23 -- exceptions. No person may possess a wild animal unless It 24 is used in a fur-farming enterprise, contained in a 25 zoological exhibition in such a manner that it may not come 1 in physical contact with members of the public, or acquired 2 by an educational institution for scientific research.

3 Section 3. Quarantine -- destruction -- testing. (1) 4 Whenever a person possesses a wild animal, the department or 5 state veterinarian may confiscate the animal for quarantine 6 or take any other reasonable action considered necessary to 7 protect the public health.

8 (2) If a wild animal confiscated under subsection (1)
9 has bitten or otherwise exposed a person to rabies, the
10 animal must be destroyed and its brain submitted to the
11 department of livestock for rabies testing.

Section 4. Payment of expenses. Expenses incurred by
 the state under [section 3] must be paid by the person from
 whom possession of the wild animal was taken.

15 Section 5. Authority to adopt rules. The department.
16 with the approval of the department of livestock, may adopt
17 rules necessary for the implementation and administration of
13 [this act].

19 Section 6. Civil penalty. A person who violates any 20 provision of [this act] or rules adopted pursuant to [this 21 act] is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$100 per 22 day. Each day of violation constitutes a separate 23 violation.

24 Section 7. Enforcement. The department may institute 25 and maintain in the name of the state any necessary

enforcement proceedings. Upon the request of the department, 1 2 the county attorney of the county of violation shall 3 petition the district court to recover the civil penalty. Section 8. Collection of money. Money collected 4 pursuant to [this act] shall be deposited in the state 5 general fund whenever the department institutes and 6 maintains the action or in the appropriate county fund 7 8 whenever the county attorney petitions the district court. -End-
