6 councils, and committees authorized under [this act] shall
7 give special attention and consideration to those sectors of
8 the economy and business which:

9 - enhance local ownership and control of businesses by
10 Montana residents;

11 - provide jobs that will be substantially filled by
12 current Montana residents as opposed to providing jobs that
13 will be filled by nonresidents coming into the state to fill
14 such jobs;

15 - maintain and improve a clean and healthful
16 environment, with emphasis on conservation, renewable
17 resources, and alternative energy production;

18 - benefit small and medium-sized businesses as defined
19 by rules adopted by the economic development board;

20 - encourage or benefit the processing, refining,
21 marketing, and innovative use and promotion of Montana's
22 agricultural products;

23 - pay the prevailing wage for the occupation; and

24 - have demonstrable affirmative action plans for
25 employing veterans, women, minorities, and handicapped

1 people.

2 HOUSE BILL 1

3 House Select Committee on Economic Development

5 It is the intent of the legislature that all programs,
6 councils, and committees authorized under [this act] shall
7 give special attention and consideration to those sectors of
8 the economy and business which:

9 - enhance local ownership and control of businesses by
10 Montana residents;

11 - provide jobs that will be substantially filled by
12 current Montana residents as opposed to providing jobs that
13 will be filled by nonresidents coming into the state to fill
14 such jobs;

15 - maintain and improve a clean and healthful
16 environment, with emphasis on conservation, renewable
17 resources, and alternative energy production;

18 - benefit small and medium-sized businesses as defined
19 by rules adopted by the economic development board;

20 - encourage or benefit the processing, refining,
21 marketing, and innovative use and promotion of Montana's
22 agricultural products;

23 - pay the prevailing wage for the occupation; and

24 - have demonstrable affirmative action plans for

2 All committees and councils authorized or funded by
