13 Section 10. Appropriation. There is appropriated for 14 the biennium ending June 30, 1987, \$12,000 \$6,000 from the 15 general fund to the legislative council for use by the 16 committee on Indian affairs.

17 Section 11. Effective date. This act is effective on18 passage and approval.
