#### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Senate Bill 62 provides for disability benefits for police officers covered under PERS and requires all cities not having a locally administered police retirement fund to participate in the Municipal Police Officers' Retirement System.

#### **ASSUMPTIONS:**

1. There are 106 police officers under PERS.

2. All members will transfer to Municipal Police Officer's Retirement System.

3. The unfunded liability will decrease for PERS and increase for the state or local systems.

4. The unfunded liability will be covered by the premium tax collected by the state auditor.
