WHEREAS, federal employees are thereby denied the constitutional right to participate fully as private citizens in the political process of this nation; and

WHEREAS, the Hatch Act may be amended or repealed by Congress but has remained essentially unchanged in this regard since its passage; and

WHEREAS, the State of Montana strongly supports legislation that would provide federal employees with all rights granted to private citizens, including the right of free political expression.
