4 CLOSURE OF WESTERN MONTANA COLLEGE, EASTERN MONTANA COLLEGE, 5 6 NORTHERN MONTANA COLLEGE, AND MONTANA COLLEGE OF MINERAL 7 SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY BY JULY 1, 1988, UNLESS THE BOARD OF 8 REGENTS OF HIGHER EDUCATION ESTABLISHES BRANCH COLLEGES; 9 ALLOWING COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO BE ESTABLISHED IF BRANCH 10 COLLEGES ARE NOT ESTABLISHED; ALLOWING AND SETTING STANDARDS 11 FOR BRANCH COLLEGES: AMENDING SECTIONS 20-25-201 AND 12 20-25-301, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE."

14 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

15 NEW SECTION. Section 1. Purpose -- findings. (1) The 16 legislature recognizes that the people of this state desire 17 quality higher education. The legislature finds, however, 18 that funds are not available to maintain quality education 19 at each unit of the university system as long as the 20 university system is made up of six separate and independent 21 units, each with its own administrative and educational 22 expenses.

23 (2) The legislature also recognizes the broad power
24 and authority of the board of regents to manage the
25 university system. Nevertheless, it is the prerogative of

the legislature to appropriate money for maintenance of the
 university system and the duty of the legislature to
 appropriate funds in the amount and manner most conducive to
 quality higher education.

(3) Because funds are not available to support a 5 quality education at each one of the six units of the 6 university system, the smaller four colleges may no longer 7 be administered or funded as separate and independent units 8 of the university system. The legislature encourages, 9 10 however, the establishment of either branch colleges or 11 community colleges to replace the four smaller colleges, and will fund such branch or community colleges, if it is 12 13 fiscally possible.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 2. Branch colleges. (1) The
board of regents may establish branch colleges attached
administratively and financially to either Montana state
university or the university of Montana.

18 (2) A branch college must be administered by its
19 parent university with the university president as the chief
20 administrator of the branch college.

21 (3) A branch college shall provide undergraduate
22 education with a certificate after 2 years of satisfactory
23 performance by a student in good standing.

24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 3. Appropriation -- eastern
 25 Montana college. (1) There is appropriated to the board of

regents of higher education \$13,779,827 from the current
 unrestricted fund for operation of eastern Montana college
 until July 1, 1988, and \$11,830,094 from the general fund
 for payment of outstanding contractual obligations of
 eastern Montana college after July 1, 1988.

6 (2) If the board of regents establishes a branch 7 college at eastern Montana college by July 1, 1988, there is 8 appropriated to the board of regents \$13,634,827 from the 9 current unrestricted fund for operation of eastern Montana 10 college as a branch college of the university of Montana.

(3) If the board of regents does not establish a
 branch college at eastern Montana college by July 1, 1988, a
 community college may be established.

14 (4) Money from supplemental or emergency funds may not
15 be used to fund eastern Montana college unless it becomes a
16 branch college of the university of Montana or a community
17 college.

18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 4. Appropriation -- northern 19 Montana college. (1) There is appropriated to the board of 20 regents of higher education \$7,586,260 from the current 21 unrestricted fund for operation of northern Montana college 22 until July 1, 1988, and \$3,378,696 from the general fund for 23 payment of outstanding contractual obligations of northern 24 Montana college after July 1, 1988.

25 (2) If the board of regents establishes a branch

college at northern Montana college by July 1, 1988, there
 is appropriated to the board of regents \$7,411,260 from the
 current unrestricted fund for operation of northern Montana
 college as a branch college of Montana state university.

5 (3) If the board of regents does not establish a
6 branch college at northern Montana college by July 1, 1988,
7 a community college may be established.

8 (4) Money from supplemental or emergency funds may not 9 be used to fund northern Montana college unless it becomes a 10 branch college of Montana state university or a community 11 college.

12 NEW SECTION. Section 5. Appropriation --Montana 13 college of mineral science and technology. (1) There is 14 appropriated to the board of regents of higher education \$8,783,160 from the current unrestricted fund for operation 15 16 of Montana college of mineral science and technology until July 1, 1988, and \$6,784,712 from the general fund for 17 18 payment of outstanding contractual obligations of Montana college of mineral science and technology after July 1, 19 20 1988.

(2) If the board of regents establishes a branch
college at Montana college of mineral science and
technology, there is appropriated to the board of regents
\$8,551,398 from the current unrestricted fund for operation
of Montana college of mineral science and technology as a

1 branch college of Montana state university.

2 (3) If the board of regents does not establish a 3 branch college at Montana college of mineral science and 4 technology by July 1, 1988, a community college may be 5 established.

6 (4) Money from supplemental or emergency funds may not
7 be used to fund Montana college of mineral science and
8 technology unless it becomes a branch college of Montana
9 state university or a community college.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 6. Appropriation -- western 11 Montana college. (1) There is appropriated to the board of 12 regents of higher education \$3,936,631 from the current 13 unrestricted fund for operation of western Montana college 14 until July 1, 1988, and \$1,666,530 from the general fund for 15 payment of outstanding contractual obligations of western 16 Montana college after July 1, 1988.

17 (2) If the board of regents establishes a branch
18 college at western Montana college by July 1, 1988, there is
19 appropriated to the board of regents \$3,804,631 from the
20 current unrestricted fund for operation of western Montana
21 college as a branch college of the university of Montana.

(3) If the board of regents does not establish a
branch college at western Montana college by July 1, 1988, a
community college may be established.

25 (4) Money from supplemental or emergency funds may not

be used to fund western Montana college unless it becomes a branch college of the university of Montana or a community college.

units of the system such authority as may be deemed
 expedient relating to immediate control and management,
 other than authority relating to financial matters or the
 selection of the teachers, employees, and faculty;

5 (11) confer, at the regents' discretion, upon the 6 president and faculty of each of the units of the system for 7 the best interest of the unit such authority relating to the 8 immediate control and management, other than financial, and 9 the selection of teachers and employees;

10 (12) prevent unnecessary duplication of courses at the 11 units of the system;

(13) appoint a certified professional geologist or 12 registered mining engineer as the director of the Montana 13 state bureau of mines and geology, who shall be designated 14 the state geologist, and appoint any other necessary 15 assistants and employees and fix their compensation. The 16 regents shall prepare a report to each regular session of 17 the legislature showing the progress and condition of the 18 bureau, including any other necessary or required 19 information. 20

(14) supervise and control the agricultural experiment
station, along with any executive or subordinate board or
authority which may be appointed by the governor with the
advice and consent of the regents;

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 9. Codification instruction. 6 Section 2 is intended to be codified as an integral part of 7 Title 20, chapter 25, part 2, and the provisions of Title 8 20, chapter 25, part 2, apply to section 2.

NEW SECTION. Section 10. Coordination instruction.
Any appropriation for the university system in House Bill
No. 100 is reduced by the amount appropriated in this act.
<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 11. Effective date. This act is
effective July 1, 1987.

# DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act providing for the closure of Western Montana College, Eastern Montana College, Northern Montana College, and Montana College of Mineral Science and Technology by July 1, 1988, unless the Board of Regents of Higher Education establishes branch campuses; providing specific general fund and/or current unrestricted fund appropriations for each campus in FY89 for closure and branch campus options.

## CLOSURE ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Each college would operate normally in FY88.
- 2. Each college would close in FY89.
- 3. Current unrestricted and general fund appropriations are specified by the proposed legislation.
- 4. Impact on MSU and UM are not estimated.
- 5. Assume continuation of FY88 current unrestricted fund appropriation specified in the proposed legislation for comparative purposes in FY89.
- 6. Assume general fund constitutes 60% of current unrestricted fund appropriations.
- 7. General fund appropriation for closure option is for one-time costs of termination payouts and defeasing bonds.

No impact in FY88.
