NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

That an appropriate interim committee be assigned to study:

- (1) the designation of a state agency to bear the responsibility for identification of hazardous materials risks and for planning for response to, mitigation of, and recovery from hazardous materials incidents;
- (2) assistance for local governments in bearing the costs resulting from a hazardous materials incident;
- (3) recording and documenting hazardous materials incidents;
- (4) coordination of efforts of all levels and agencies of government; and
- (5) clarification of the responsibility and liability of local governments in hazardous materials incidents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the interim committee report its findings and recommendations to the 51st Legislature and submit legislation to address the problems it identifies.
