- 9. Certification would require 1 FTE (grade 16, step 2, \$26,716 per year salary and benefits) and 1/2 FTE(grade 7, step 2, \$8,425 salaries and benefits plus 20% allowed for operating expenses).
- 10. It is not the intent of this bill that bingo machines be certified or locally licensed.

- 9. Certification equipment: emulator @ \$50,000, other equipment @ \$25,000. (One time Expenses).
- 10. Certification would require 1 FTE (grade 16,step 2, \$26,716 per year salary and benefits) and 1/2 FTE(grade 7, step 2, \$8,425 salaries and benefits plus 20% allowed for operating expenses).
- 11. It is not the intent of this bill that bingo machines be certified or locally licensed.
