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WHEREAS, the right of Montana citizens to keep and bear
arms and the right to carry arms openly are protected by the
Montana Constitution; and

WHEREAS, Montana has a statutory process, in section
45-8-319, MCA, whereby citizens of the state may apply for
permits to carry concealed handguns; and

WHEREAS, according to the most reliable data, 19
counties have not issued any concealed handgun permits and
another 15 counties have issued permits to five or fewer
citizens in each county, indicating that 34 of the state's
56 counties issue either no permits or few permits; and

is not working; and

2 WHEREAS, these gun owner organizations have requested 3 without success that the Legislature reform the procedures 4 to obtain a concealed weapon permit in a fair and efficient 5 manner; and

6 WHEREAS, a number of issues relating to concealed

8 of the 51st Legislature in both the subcommittee and the
9 full committee of the House Judiciary Committee.

13 (1) That an interim committee be appointed to study

(a) review concealed weapon legislation, including but
not limited to handguns, in other states with demographic
characteristics and popular attitudes similar to Montana's;
(b) review prior legislative proposals to revise the

13 (f) examine the potential personal liability to a law14 enforcement official who issues a concealed weapon permit;

15 (g) review the legislative history of states that have 16 recently revised their concealed weapon laws, such as 17 Florida and North Dakota, and consult with local law 18 enforcement officials and criminal justice experts in those 19 states to determine whether these new laws have caused law 20 enforcement problems related to the abuse of permit 21 privileges; and

(h) encourage the active participation of
representatives of statewide or regional organizations of
gun owners, law enforcement administrator organizations, law
enforcement line officer organizations, the Montana
