STATEMENT OF INTENT

A statement of intent is required for this bill because it grants to the department of administration the authority to define by rule which printed documents are public documents. It is the intent of the legislature that public documents be defined as those printed publications that are primarily intended for distribution to the public and not primarily intended for state agencies or employees or bid documents.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

Section 1. Section 18-4-221, MCA, is amended to read:

"18-4-221. General procurement authority and duties of
department -- rules. (1) Except as otherwise provided in
this chapter, the department shall adopt rules, consistent

 - (a) "Duplicating" means the printed reproduction of an image produced from a paper master plate printed on #4 or #5 sulphite paper no larger than 11x17 inches and printed with one color only and with no more than a standard letter fold.
 - (b) "Printing" means the reproduction of an image from a printing surface made by a contact impression that causes a transfer of ink or the reproduction of the impression by a photographic process and includes graphic arts, typesetting,

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- (+)(2) Except as provided in 1-11-301, the department has exclusive power, subject to the approval of the governor, to contract for all printing for any purpose used by the state in any state office (elective or appointive), agency, or institution.
- (3) (a) Except as provided in subsection (3)(b), the department shall contract under the provisions of this title for all printing of public documents as defined in 18-7-302.

(1) The-term "public Public document" includes—any means a publication of a state agency meant for dissemination to the public, but does not include educational—materials—published—by—a—unit—of—the—university system—or—the—superintendent—of—public—instruction;—reports of—the—legislative—auditor;—travel—promotion—materials; standard—forms;—bid—specifications;—opinions—of—the—attorney general;—opinions—of—the—supreme—court;—session—laws;—the administrative—rules—of—Montana;—Montana—code—annotated; regular—periodical—publications—sold—to—the—general—public solely——through—subscription—and—newsstand—sale;—or—a

publication-specifically-exempted-by-the--publishing--policy 1 2 committee-when-inclusion-of-that-publication-under-this-part 3 is-not-considered-in-the-best-interests-of-the-state printed materials primarily distributed to agencies or agency 5 employees or documents prepared for and used in the competitive bidding process. The department may define by 6 7 rule which documents are public documents.

STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

In compliance with a written request, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for SB354, as introduced.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act requiring the Department of Administration to contract for the printing of public documents; providing and revising definitions regarding printing; amending Sections 18-4-221, 18-7-101, 18-7-302, and 18-7-307, MCA; and repealing Section 18-7-305, MCA.

ASSUMPTIONS:

Department of Administration

- 1. Will require an estimated 2,500 jobs currently produced internally at Publications and Graphics to be procured from the from the private sector.
- 2. Estimates do not include any additional workload from other state agency centers.
- 3. Additional staff will be required to handle additional procurement activity.
- 4. Additional equipment will be required for purchasing staff.
- 5. Jobs procured commercially will cost 20% more than if produced internally, with additional expenses for procurement and administration.

Department of Institutions

- 1. Eliminates print shop operation at Montana State Prison.
- 2. Eliminate 3-6 inmate jobs.
- 3. Agencies will be required to go through Publications and Graphics. This will be more costly and time consuming.

Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks

- 1. The departments's duplicating center would no longer print the following items: NCR forms; cardstock; 2 color printing; season tentatives; posters; pamphlets; news releases; and commission agendas. These print jobs represent approximately 34% of the business at duplicating center.
- 2. Approximately 25% of the duplicating center costs are variable and 75% fixed.
- 3. The duplicating center operates on a cost reimbursement basis. Annual revenue and expenses are approximately \$106,000 per year.
- 4. The resulting decrease in printing jobs done internally will result in increased costs for duplicating the agency continues to do. It is assumed that even with increased duplicating costs, the agency will remain competitive with the private sector.
- 5. Contracting will require more administrative time and expense, and will delay the turnaround time on printing requests. Any expense related to this will be absorbed by current budgets.

Commissioner of Higher Education

- 1. The bill requires printing, duplicating, and pre-press work to be bid out to commercial printers, both instate and out-of-state. At a minimum, jobs will cost 3% to 15% higher because of the overhead charges applied by Publications and Graphics.
- 2. Additional costs will be incurred due to significant additional lead time required to prepare a job for bidding and interacting with out side printers.

Office of Public Instruction

- 1. The cost of printing will remain constant for the next biennium.
- 2. The cost of preparing photo-ready copy will no longer be done resulting in additional costs of 15%-20%. Department of Labor and Industry
- 1. Assume 23% increase in costs for contracting the printing of public documents based on previous studies conducted on this issue.
- 2. Assume public documents are any documents provided to the public including but not limited to forms for gathering of information pertaining to employment, training, and workers' compensation programs, statistical publications, legal documents, reports, and meeting minutes.
- 3. Assume 58.64% of printing workload would be contracted.
- 4. Assume certain costs both personal services and operating will remain fixed and not be reduced by the loss of 58.64% workload for the following reasons: a) duplicating of agency documents will continue to be done in-house; b) need for supervision of duplicating operations; c) need for coordination of printing contracts with DOA Publications and Graphics and Purchasing; d) increase in accounting workload and costs due to contract payment and monitoring; e) increase in storage requirements due to the need to order printed material in quantity.
- 5. Assume DOA will pay for the development of administrative rules pertaining to the proposed legislation. Legislative Council
- 1. Documents, including bills, daily status, journal and other proceeding documents, currently produced for the Legislature for use by the Legislature and the public during legislative sessions would be subjected to the competitive bidding process.
- 2. Text now prepared by the Montana Legislative Council on the state's mainframe as the final, camera-ready copy of the The Laws of Montana, The Montana Code Annotated, The Annotations to the Montana Code Annotated, the Journal of the Senate, and the Journal of the House of Representatives, would have to be re-coded and typeset by the contracted printer or other contractor.
- 3. The production time of all documents described in items 1 and 2 above would be extended beyond current production time. The statutory requirement for an October 1 publication deadline for the Montana Code Annotated could not be met, after the effective date of the act, with current resources.
- 4. The cost for producing the camera-ready copy of the Montana Code Annotated would increase from the current, approximate \$1.50 per page cost to at least the former cost of approximately \$6.50 per page. Camera-ready copy production for other typeset publications requiring large-scale equipment would see similar cost increases.

LONG-RANGE EFFECTS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

It is likely that the functioning of the Legislature would be hampered to some extent if the printing of bills, statuses, agendas, and other documents were subjected to outside printing rather than having the printing done in the basement of the Capitol. If the competitive bidding process resulted in a private contractor locating in the Capitol it is likely that the cost of printing legislative documents would be increased.

TECHNICAL OR MECHANICAL DEFECTS OR CONFLICTS WITH EXISTING LEGISLATION:

By deleting "Travel Promotion materials" from Section 3, 18-7-302 in the proposed bill. All future Travel promotion publications and the highway map will be defined as public documents under 18-7-306 which will require printing on the exterior cover"...copies of this public document were published at an estimated cost of \$...per copy, which includes \$...for printing and \$...for distribution." This is poor tourism marketing and will be detrimental to the state's image as we mail 400,000 copies annually out-of-state.
