(1) The principal of the 14 acquisitions trust established in [section 1] is intended to 15 be a permanent, nonexpendable trust subject to investment by 16 the board of investments in accordance with investment 17 principles established for the investment of state funds in 18 Title 17, chapter 6, part 2.

19 (2) Unless otherwise provided by the donor, donations 20 of \$500 or more received pursuant to 22-3-107(9) and revenue 21 earned by the Montana historical society from sales provided 22 for by 22-3-107(6) must be placed in the acquisitions trust. 23 (3) Interest earned on the principal of the 24 acquisitions trust may be used only for the purpose of 25 acquiring society library, museum, archive, and photoarchive
