In compliance with a written request, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for SB0039, as introduced.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act providing for discontinuing licensed acute hospital care on the Galen campus of the Montana State Hospital (MSH).

ASSUMPTIONS:

- Senate Bill 40 also is enacted.
- 2. Current law figures are taken from the LFA current level 1995 Biennium Budget Analysis.
- 3. Proposed law figures are the Executive Budget current level recommendation plus one modification to allow added staffing in the Center for the Aged to accommodate some of the current MSH patients.
- 4. The LFA 1995 Biennium Budget Analysis estimates that lost Medicaid revenue to the general fund would be \$730,032 in FY94 and \$679,070 in FY95.
- 5. The Executive Budget recommendation assumed enactment of SB39 and SB40 in both expenditures and revenue estimates.
- 6. The average of 5 FY93 termination payouts at MSH was \$646.00 per employee. Department of Corrections and Human Services estimates that vacancy savings from employees changing jobs or terminating early will approximately offset payouts at this average level.
