LIEN ACT; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

NEW SECTION. **Section 1.** Repealer. Section 4, Chapter
469, Laws of 1991, is repealed.

NEW SECTION. **Section 2.** Effective date. [This act] is
effective on passage and approval.

In compliance with a written request, there is hereby submitted a Fiscal Note for SB0043, third reading.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

A bill for an act removing the sunset provision of the physician, nurse, physical therapist, occupational therapist, chiropractor, dentist, and hospital lien act; providing for an immediate effective date.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The proposal will have no effect on budgeted state personal services expenditures during the 1995 biennium. Any significant effect on the solvency of state self-insurance fund will be reflected in the copayment and deductible levels of the state plan (unless a change in the state's insurance contribution is passed in response to the legislation).

LONG-RANGE EFFECTS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Any future impact of the proposal would depend on its marginal impact on the financial condition of the self-insurance fund and the resultant pressure for an increase in the state's insurance contribution. The magnitude of the likely impact, if any, on provider billings can not be determined due to complex dynamics of provider ratemaking, member agreement negotiations and behavioral reactions of consumers.
