# STATEMENT OF INTENT

A statement of intent is required for this bill because
[sections 4 through 10] grant rulemaking authority to the
board of funeral service to implement provisions of this

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bill. It is the intent of the legislature that the board, at
 a minimum, adopt rules:

3 (1) establishing license application procedures,
4 license fees, criteria for minimum requirements for license
5 eligibility, and requirements for license renewal;

6 (2) developing procedures for the issuance, renewal,7 suspension, and revocation of licenses; and

8 .(3) creating disciplinary standards for licensees,
9 establishing investigatory procedures for processing
10 complaints, and adopting ethical standards for licensed
11 crematory operators.

13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

NEW SECTION. Section 1. Purpose. The legislature finds that because the practice of crematory operation affects the lives of the people of this state and because some Montanans may exercise their right to choose cremation for themselves or a loved one, it is the purpose of [sections 1 and 4 through 10] to:

(1) provide standards for the licensing and regulation
of crematoriums in order to protect the public health,

22 safety, and welfare; and

23 (2) ensure the qualified and professional practice of24 crematory operation.

25 Section 2. Section 2-15-1853, MCA, is amended to read:

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1	"2-15-1853, Board of morticians funeral service. (1)
2	There is a board of morticians funeral service.
3	(2) The board consists of five members appointed by the
4	governor with the consent of the senate. Four Three members
5	shall must be licensed morticians. One member shall must be
6	a representative of the public who is not engaged in the
7	practice of mortuary science or funeral directing. <u>One</u>
8	member must be a licensed crematory operator or crematory
9	technician or a mortician who is engaged in a crematory
10	operation.
11	(3) Board members shall serve staggered 5-year terms.
12	(4) The board is allocated to the department for
13	administrative purposes only as prescribed in 2-15-121."
14	Section 3. Section 37-19-101, MCA, is amended to read:
15	<b>*37-19-101. Definitions.</b> Unless the context requires
16	otherwise, in this chapter, the following definitions apply:
17	<ol> <li>"Authorizing agent" means a person legally entitled</li> </ol>
18	to order the cremation of human remains. An authorizing
19	agent is, in order of preference:
20	(a) a spouse;
21	(b) an adult child;
22	(c) a parent;
23	(d) a close relative of the deceased; or
24	(e) in the absence of a person listed in subsections
25	(1)(a) through (1)(d), a personal representative, a public

1	administrator, the deceased through a preneed authorization,
2	or others as designated by board rule.
3	(1)(2) "Board" means the board of morticians funeral
4	service provided for in 2-15-1853.
5	(3) "Closed container" means a container in which
6	cremated remains can be placed and enclosed in a manner that
7	prevents leakage or spillage of cremated remains or entrance
8	of foreign material.
9	(4) "Cremated remains" means all human remains
10	recovered after the completion of the cremation, including
11	pulverization that leaves only bone fragments reduced to
12	unidentifiable dimensions.
13	(5) "Cremation" means the technical process, using
14	heat, that reduces human remains to bone fragments. The
15	reduction takes place through heat and evaporation.
16	(6) "Cremation chamber" means the enclosed space within
17	which the cremation process takes place. Cremation chambers
18	of crematoriums licensed by this chapter must be used
19	exclusively for the cremation of human remains.
20	(7) "Cremation container" means the container in which
21	the human remains are placed in the cremation chamber for a
22	cremation. A cremation container must meet substantially all
23	of the following standards:
24	(a) be composed of readily combustible materials
25	suitable for cremation;

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1	(b) be able to be closed in order to provide a complete
2	covering for the human remains;
3	(c) be resistant to leakage and spillage;
4	(d) be rigid enough for handling with ease; and
5	(e) be able to provide protection for the health,
6	safety, and integrity of crematory personnel.
7	(8) "Crematory" means the building or portion of a
8	building that houses the cremation chamber and the holding
9	facility.
10	(9) "Crematory operator" means the person in charge of
11	the licensed crematory facility.
12	(10) "Crematory technician" means an employee of a
13	crematory facility who is trained to perform cremations and
14	is licensed by the board.
15	(2) "Department" means the department of commerce
16	provided for in Title 2, chapter 15, part 18.
17	<del>(3)<u>(12)</u> "Embalming" means the preservation and</del>
18	disinfection of the dead human body by application of
19	chemicals, externally, internally, or both.
20	<pre>(4)(13) "Funeral directing" includes:</pre>
21	(a) supervising funerals, including the making of
22	preneed or at-need contractual arrangements for funerals;
23	(b) preparing dead bodies for burial, other than by
24	embalming;
25	(c) maintaining a mortuary for the preparation,

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1	disposition, or care of dead human bodies; and
	-
2	(d) the-holding-out representing to the public that one
3	is a funeral director or-undertaker.
4	(14) "Holding facility" means an area within or adjacent
5	to the crematory facility designated for the retention of
6	human remains prior to cremation that must:
7	(a) comply with any applicable public health law;
8	(b) preserve the dignity of the human remains;
9	(c) recognize the health, safety, and integrity of the
10	crematory operator and crematory personnel; and
11	(d) be secure from access by anyone other than
12	authorized personnel.
13	(15) "Human remains" means the body of a deceased person
14	or part of a body or limb that has been removed from a
15	living person, including the body, part of a body, or limb
16	in any stage of decomposition.
17	<del>(5)</del> (16) A-"mortician"is "Mortician" means a person
18	licensed under this chapter to practice mortuary science.
19	(6)(17) Amortuary" means a place of
20	business used for the care and preparation for burial or
21	transportation of dead human bodies or a place where a
22	person represents himself-as that the person is engaged in
23	the profession of mortuary science or funeral directing.
24	(7)(18) "Mortuary science" is means the profession or
25	practice of funeral directing and embalming.

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1 (19) "Temporary container" means a receptacle for 2 cremated remains that is usually made of cardboard, plastic 3 film, or similar material designed to hold the cremated 4 remains until an urn or other permanent container is 5 acquired.

6 (20) "Urn" means a receptacle designed to permanently
7 encase the cremated remains."

NEW SECTION. Section 4. Licenses required -- display 8 of licenses -- renewal -- penalty for late renewal. (1) A 9 person doing business in this state or a cemetery, mortuary, 10 corporation, partnership, 11 joint venture, voluntary organization, or other entity that erects, maintains, or 12 provides the necessary appliances and facilities for the 13 cremation of human remains and that conducts cremations must 14 15 be licensed by the board, beginning July 1, 1993. The license must be displayed in a conspicuous place in the 16 17 crematory facility.

(2) A crematory license expires on June 30 of each year
and may be renewed upon payment of a fee set by the board,
which includes the cost of annual inspection. If a crematory
facility is attached to a licensed mortuary, only one
inspection fee may be charged for inspection of both a
mortuary facility under 37-19-403 and a crematory facility.

24 (3) The board may set a penalty fee for late renewal of25 a license.

1 (4) A person in charge of a licensed crematory facility 2 must be licensed as a crematory operator by the board. A 3 person employed by a licensed crematory facility must be 4 licensed as a crematory technician by the board. The license 5 must be displayed in a conspicuous place in the crematory 6 facility.

7 (5) Crematory operator and crematory technician 8 licenses expire on June 30 of each year and may be renewed 9 upon payment of a fee set by the board. On-the-job training 10 must be provided to a crematory technician at the time of 11 employment.

NEW SECTION. Section 5. Application -- power of board 12 13 to set standards -- inspection -- fees. (1) Application for a crematory, crematory operator, or crematory technician 14 license must be on forms prescribed by the board and must 15 16 include the name of the applicant, name of the crematory facility, location of the crematory facility and its mailing 17 address, and any further information the board requires. To 18 19 be eligible for licensure:

20 (a) as a crematory facility, an application must
21 include a description of the type of structure and equipment
22 to be used in the operation of the crematory facility;

(b) as a crematory operator, an applicant must be at
least 18 years of age, must be a high school graduate or
have an equivalent degree, and must be of good moral

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2 (2) The application must be accompanied by an
3 application fee set by the board.

4 (3) The board must be notified of any change of 5 ownership of a crematory within 30 days of the change.

6 (4) A license to operate a crematory in Montana may be 7 issued only upon inspection of the crematory facility and 8 upon a finding of compliance with standards for operation 9 set by the board.

(5) A temporary permit may be issued to operate a
crematory facility, as prescribed by board rule, that is
effective until the initial inspection is completed to the
board's satisfaction.

14 (6) A crematory facility may be inspected by a board
15 member or the board's designated representative during
16 business hours.

17 (7) The board shall adopt rules governing the cremation
18 of human remains, the transportation of human remains,
19 sanitation, equipment, fire protection, building
20 construction, and recordkeeping.

(8) A crematory facility shall comply with all local
building codes, environmental standards, and applicable
state and local regulations.

24 (9) A new crematory facility shall pay an initial25 inspection fee, set by the board, that must accompany the

1 application.

2 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 6. Cremation authorization 3 required -- identification. (1) Except as otherwise provided 4 in this chapter, a crematory may not cremate human remains 5 until it has received a cremation authorization.

6 (2) A crematory may not accept unidentified human7 remains.

8 (3) Appropriate identification must be placed upon the
9 exterior of the cremation container upon receipt of the
10 human remains.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 7. Cremation procedures -12 cremation containers. (1) Human remains may not be cremated
13 except in a licensed crematory.

14 (2) Human remains may not be cremated within 24 hours15 after the time of death.

16 (3) A body may not be cremated with a pacemaker or 17 other potentially hazardous implant, as defined by the 18 board, including any toxic or explosive-type sealed 19 implants, in place. The authorizing agent is responsible for 20 taking all necessary steps to ensure that any pacemakers or 21 other hazardous implants are removed prior to cremation.

22 (4) A crematory shall hold human remains, prior to23 their cremation, under the following conditions:

24 (a) In the event the crematory is unable to perform25 cremation upon receipt of the human remains, it shall place

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1 the human remains in a holding facility.

2 (b) If the human remains are not embalmed, they may not 3 be held longer than 48 hours after the time of death outside 4 of a refrigerated facility.

5 (5) Human remains delivered to a crematory may not be 6 removed from the cremation container, and the cremation 7 container must be cremated with the human remains.

(6) Unauthorized persons may not be permitted in the R 9 retort area while any human remains are awaiting cremation. 10 being cremated, or being removed from the cremation chamber. (7) The unauthorized, simultaneous cremation of human 11 remains of more than one person within the same cremation 12 13 chamber is prohibited unless the crematory has received 14 express written authorization from all appropriate authorizing agents for the human remains to be cremated 15 simultaneously. A written authorization exempts the 16 17 crematory from liability for commingling of the product of 18 the cremation process.

19 (8) The identification of the human remains, as 20 indicated on the cremation container, must be verified by 21 the crematory operator or crematory technician immediately 22 prior to the cremation container being placed within the 23 cremation chamber. The identification must be removed from 24 the cremation container and be placed near the cremation 25 chamber control panel where it must remain until the 1 cremation process is complete.

(9) Upon completion of the cremation process, all
recoverable residue must be removed from the cremation
chamber. All residue of the cremation process must be
separated from material other than bone fragments, which
must be processed so as to reduce the bone fragments to
unidentifiable particles.

8 (10) Cremated remains, with proper identification, must
9 be packed and placed in a temporary container or urn ordered
10 by the authorizing agent.

11 (11) If the cremated remains will not fit within the 12 dimensions of the temporary container or urn, the remainder 13 of the cremated remains must be returned to the authorizing 14 agent in a separate container.

15 (12) If the cremated remains are to be shipped, the 16 temporary container or designated receptacle ordered by the 17 authorizing agent must be packed securely in a suitable, 18 sturdy, pressure resistant, and properly sealed container.

(13) Cremated remains may be shipped only by a method
that has an internal tracing system available and that
provides a receipt signed by the person accepting delivery.

NEW SECTION. Section 8. Disposition of cremated
 remains. (1) The person arranging the cremation shall
 require the authorizing agent to provide a signed statement
 that specifies the ultimate disposition of the cremated

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1 remains, if known.

authorizing agent is responsible for (2) The 2 disposition of the cremated remains. If, after a period of 3. 90 days from the date of cremation, the authorizing agent 4 has not specified the ultimate disposition or claimed the 5 cremated remains, the crematory or person in possession of 6 the cremated remains may then dispose of the cremated 7 remains in any manner permitted by law. A record of the 8 disposition must be made and kept by the crematory operator. 9 This subsection applies to all cremated remains in the 10 possession of a crematory or other party. 11

12 (3) Except with the express written consent of the13 authorizing agent, a person may not:

14 (a) dispose of or scatter cremated remains in a manner 15 or in a location that commingles the cremated remains with 16 those of another person. The provisions of this subsection 17 (3) do not apply to the scattering of cremated remains from 18 individual containers over public waterways or by air or to 19 the scattering of cremated remains in an area located in a 20 dedicated cemetery and used exclusively for that purpose.

(b) place cremated remains of more than one person in the same closed container. This subsection (3) does not apply to the cremated remains of members of the same family that are placed in a common closed container designed for the cremated remains of more than one person. 1 (4) Cremated remains must be delivered to the 2 individual specified by the authorizing agent on the 3 cremation authorization form.

4 (5) A representative of the crematory and the individual receiving the cremated remains shall sign a 5 receipt indicating the name of the deceased and the date, 6 time, and place of the delivery. The crematory shall retain 7 a copy of the receipt, and the original must be given to the 8 9 authorizing agent. After this delivery, the cremated remains 10 may be transported, in this state, without a permit and disposed of in accordance with this chapter. 11

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 9. Limitation of liability. (1) A 13 person signing a cremation authorization form shall warrant 14 the truthfulness of any facts set forth in the form, 15 including the identity of the deceased whose remains are to 16 be cremated and the signer's authority to order cremation.

17 (2) A crematory, crematory operator, or crematory 18 technician who cremates human remains or releases or 19 disposes of cremated remains is not liable for the 20 cremation, release, or disposition if the crematory, 21 crematory operator, or crematory technician has received a 22 signed cremation authorization form from the authorizing 23 agent.

24 (3) A crematory operator or crematory technician is not25 responsible or liable for any valuables delivered to the

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1 crematory with the human remains.

2 (4) A crematory operator or crematory technician is not
3 liable for refusing to accept a body or perform a cremation:

4 (a) for any lawful reason;

5 .(b) if the crematory operator or crematory technician 6 has a reasonable basis for questioning any of the 7 representations made by the authorizing agent; or

8 (c) until receipt of a court order or other suitable 9 confirmation that a dispute has been settled if the 10 crematory operator or crematory technician is aware of any 11 dispute concerning the cremation of the human remains.

12 (5) If a crematory operator or crematory technician is 13 aware of any dispute concerning the release or disposition 14 of the cremated remains, the crematory operator or crematory technician may refuse to release the cremated remains until 15 the dispute has been resolved or until the crematory 16 operator or crematory technician has been provided with a 17 18 court order authorizing the release or disposition of the 19 cremated remains. A crematory, crematory operator, or 20 crematory technician is not liable for refusing to release 21 or dispose of cremated remains in accordance with this 22 subsection.

(6) Upon disposing of cremated remains, the person in
 possession of the cremated remains is discharged from any
 legal obligation or liability concerning the cremated

1 remains.

2 NEW SECTION. Section 10. Preneed cremation 3 authorizations. (1) Preneed cremation authorizations may be made with a cemetery, funeral establishment, crematory, or 4 5 any other party. Preneed authorizations must specify the 6 ultimate disposition of the cremated remains, be signed by 7 the authorizing agent, and meet other requirements 8 established by board rule.

9 (2) A crematory operator or crematory technician shall 10 comply with the terms of the preneed authorization in 11 releasing or disposing of the cremated remains at the time 12 of death unless additional or conflicting instructions are 13 received from a designated authorizing agent.

14 (3) Upon payment for cremation and disposition, a 15 crematory, crematory operator, or crematory technician in 16 possession of a cremation authorization form and the 17 deceased's human remains is not liable for the actual 18 cremation and the disposition of the cremated remains if the 19 terms of the preneed authorization have been complied with.

Section 11. Section 35-21-102, MCA, is amended to read:
"35-21-102. Definitions. For the purposes of this
chapter, certain words used herein--shall in this chapter
have the following meanings:

24 (1) "Columbarium" means a structure, room, or other
25 space in a permanent building or outdoor structure

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1 containing that contains niches for permanent inurnment of 2 cremated remains, as defined in 37-19-101, in a place used 3 or intended to be used and dedicated for interment purposes. 4 (2)--"Cremated---remains"---means--human--remains--after

5 cremation-in-a-crematory-

6 (3)--"Eremation"-means-the-reduction-of-the--body--of--a
 7 deceased-person-to-cremated-remains-in-a-crematory-

8 (4)--\*Crematory"---means---a---building---or--structure
 9 containing--one--or-more-retorts-for-the-reduction-of-bodies
 10 of-deceased-persons-to-cremated-remains-

11 (5)(2) "Crypt" or "vault" means a space in a mausoleum
12 of sufficient size used or intended to be used to entomb the
13 uncremated human remains.

14 (6)(3) "Directors" or "governing body" means the board
15 of directors, board of trustees, or other governing body of
16 a mausoleum-columbarium authority.

17 (7)(4) "Entombment" means the placement of human
 18 remains in a crypt or vault.

19 (8)(5) "Human remains" or "remains" means-the-body-of-a
20 deceased-person-and--includes-the-body--in--any--stage--of
21 decomposition--and--cremated--remains has the meaning as
22 defined in 37-19-101.

23 (9)(6) "Interment" means the disposition of human 24 remains by cremation and inurnment or entombment in a place 25 used or intended to be used and dedicated for interment purposes.

2 (10)(7) "Interment space" means any space in a crypt,
3 vault, or niche of sufficient size for the entombment or
4 inurnment of the remains of one human being.

5 (11)(8) "Inurnment" means placing cremated remains in
6 an urn or other permanent container and placing it in a
7 niche.

8 (12)(9) "Mausoleum" means a permanent building or
9 outdoor structure suitable for the entombment of human
10 remains in crypts or vaults in a place used or intended to
11 be used and dedicated for interment purposes.

12 (10) "Mausoleum business", "columbarium business", 13 and "mausoleum-columbarium business or purposes" are used 14 interchangeably and mean any and-all business and purposes requisite to, necessary for, or incident to establishing, 15 16 maintaining, operating, improving, or conducting a 17 mausoleum, columbarium, or mausoleum-columbarium; interring 18 human remains therein; and the care, preservation, and embellishment of such the property. 19

20 (14)(11) "Mausoleum-columbarium" means a building or
 21 structure containing both a mausoleum and a columbarium.

22 (15)(12) "Mausoleum-columbarium authority" means any 23 corporation, whether for profit or not for profit, owning, 24 controlling, or operating lands, buildings, or structures 25 used or intended to be used and dedicated for interment

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purposes by entombment or inurnment but shall does not refer to any corporation for profit or not for profit or any association, corporation sole, or other person owning or controlling cemetery lands or property, including mausoleums and/or or columbariums where interment is also made by ground burial.

7 (16)(13) "Niche" means a space in a columbarium or urn
8 garden used or intended to be used for inurnment of cremated
9 human remains.

10 (17)(14) "Plot" or "interment plot" means space in a 11 mausoleum or columbarium used or intended to be used for the 12 interment of human remains. Such <u>The</u> terms include and apply 13 to one or more than-one adjoining crypts or vaults or one or 14 more than-one adjoining niches.

15 (10)(15) "Plot owner", or "owner", or "proprietor" means 16 any person in whose name an interment plot stands of record 17 as owner in the office of a mausoleum-columbarium authority. 18 (10)(16) "Temporary receiving vault" means a vault used 19 or intended to be used for the temporary placement of human 20 remains.

21 (20)(17) "Urn garden" means a permanent outdoor
22 structure containing niches of stone or reinforced concrete
23 suitable for and used or intended to be used for inurnment
24 of cremated remains in a place used or intended to be used
25 and dedicated for interment purposes. Wherever Whenever the

1 context shall--permit permits, "urn garden" shall-be-deemed
2 to-be is included in "columbarium"."

3 Section 12. Section 35-21-103, MCA, is amended to read:
4 "35-21-103. Exemptions and limitations on applicability
5 of chapter. (1) The provisions of this chapter relating to
6 private mausoleums and columbariums do not apply to any of
7 the following:

8 (a) any religious corporation, church, religious 9 society or denomination, corporation sole administering 10 temporalities of any church or religious society or 11 denomination, or any cemetery, mausoleum, or columbarium 12 organized, controlled, and operated by any of them;

13 (b) any county, town, or city cemetery, mausoleum, or 14 columbarium;

(c) any crematory, crematory operator, or crematory
 technician licensed under Title 37, chapter 19.

17 (2) No <u>A</u> condition, or section, or provision of this
18 chapter shall-or may not be so construed or interpreted as
19 to apply to any act or in any way pertain to or affect any
20 Montana mausoleum corporation in existence on July 1, 1949,
21 operating under Montana charter dated prior to the year
22 1920.

23 (3) The provisions of this chapter do not affect the
24 corporate existence or rights or powers of any cemetery
25 corporation organized under any law of the state of Montana

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in which a mausoleum, columbarium, or crematory or 1 combination thereof shall-be is situated, maintained. or 2 operated in conjunction with a cemetery for the burial of 3 dead human remains by ground interment. The bill provides for the licensing and regulation of crematoriums, crematory operators, and crematory technicians; renames the board and provides for a crematory employee on the board; provides for fees, inspection, standards, record keeping, cremation procedures, disposition of cremated remains, limitation of liability and preneed cremation arrangements. Rulemaking authority is granted and crematory regulation under the mausoleum and columbarium authorities is repealed.

# ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. There are 15 crematory facilities in Montana.
- 2. There will need to be rule adoptions costing \$200 in the first year.
- 3. Each crematorium will be inspected once per year.
- 4. There will be additional costs for board operations.
