A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA DIRECTING THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH, WILDLIFE, AND PARKS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE TO INVESTIGATE AND CONDUCT A STUDY OF RESIDENCY COMPLIANCE FOR FISH AND GAME LICENSING PURPOSES AND STATE INCOME TAX PURPOSES; DIRECTING THE DEPARTMENTS TO IMPLEMENT CHANGES WHENEVER POSSIBLE TO REDUCE UNDERREPORTING OF INCOME REDUCE RESIDENCY FRAUD: AND REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENTS TO REPORT TO THE 54TH LEGISLATURE ON THE RESULTS OF THE STUDY AND ON THE NEED FOR ADDITIONAL LEGISLATION TO ADDRESS THE PROBLEMS OF UNDERREPORTING OF INCOME AND RESIDENCY FRAUD.

WHEREAS, nonresidents who claim resident status for purposes of purchasing Montana fish and game licenses perpetrate a fraud upon the people of Montana by failing to purchase the proper licenses and by failing to pay their share of income taxes if required to do so, resulting in an inequitable treatment of the hunting and fishing public and of Montana taxpayers; and WHEREAS, residents who benefit from the income generated by illegally licensed hunters and who do not pay Montana
