14	legislative and congressional districts.	
15	(2) The After the federal population census in the year 2000, the plans for redistricting and	
16	reapportionment of legislative districts must be based on the number of members in the create a	
17	80-member house of representatives and the a 40-member senate to be determined in the legislative	
18	session before the consus. The commission appointed in 1999 shall, as part of its plans, provide a method	
19	of implementing this section that takes into account the senators elected to a 4-year term in 2004 and that	
20	preserves the requirement of Article V, section 3, of The Constitution of the State of Montana that one-half	
21	of the senators must be elected every 2 years. The commission may shorten to 2 years the terms of	
22	senators elected in 2004 and provide that one-half of the senators elected in 2004 shall serve 2 years, may	
23	assign the senators elected in 2004 to newly created districts for the last 2 years of their terms, or may	
24	use any other method."

# STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

## Fiscal Note for HB0045, as introduced

#### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Provides that beginning with the regular legislative session in 2005, the legislature will have an 80-member House of Representatives and a 40-member Senate.

#### ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The Districting and Apportionment Commission will adopt a redistricting plan in 2003 that provides for 80 house districts and 40 senate districts. The plan adopted in 2003 will be in effect for the elections to be conducted in 2004.
- 2. The legislators elected in 2004 and thereafter will meet in organizational caucuses for two days and in regular session for 90 days.
- Legislator salaries, benefits, mileage, and per diem rates will remain unchanged from fiscal year 1995 levels.
- 4. All other costs of conducting legislative business remain unchanged as a result of this bill.
- 5. There will be no fiscal impact in the 1997 biennium.

### LONG-RANGE EFFECTS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Given the assumptions stated above, the costs of legislator salaries, benefits, mileage, and per diem will be reduced beginning in the 2005 biennium as shown below:
