INTRODUCED BILL

HOUSE BILL NO. 348 1 INTRODUCED BY 2 rul 3 - Avauser A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT PROVIDING FOR REGULATION OF THE RECREATIONAL AND 4 COMMERCIAL USE OF MONTANA'S PUBLIC WATERS IN CERTAIN CASES BY ALLOWING THE FISH, 5 WILDLIFE, AND PARKS COMMISSION AND THE BOARD OF OUTFITTERS TO ADOPT AND ENFORCE 6 7 RULES TO PROTECT AND PRESERVE NATURAL RESOURCES, PRESERVE THE DIVERSITY OF 8 RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES, MINIMIZE RECREATIONAL USER CONFLICTS, OR PROTECT THE PUBLIC 9 HEALTH, PUBLIC SAFETY, OR PROPERTY; AMENDING SECTIONS 37-47-201 AND 87-1-303, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE." 10 11 12 STATEMENT OF INTENT (1) A statement of intent is required for this bill because authority is granted to the fish, wildlife, 13 and parks commission in 87-1-303 to adopt rules addressing the recreational and commercial use of 14 15 Montana rivers and streams. It is intended that the commission use this authority to identify public 16 reservoirs, public lakes, rivers, and streams that are in immediate or potential danger of resource 17 degradation or social conflict over recreational uses and to develop rules to reasonably control the public 18 recreational use of identified problem waters in order to protect the resource, maintain a diversity of 19 recreational opportunities, and resolve social conflicts. Rules may include but are not limited to: 20 (a) restrictions on activities allowed; 21 (b) special seasons for special activities; 22 (c) closures of public waters; and 23 (d) the determination of restrictions on recreational and commercial use. 24 (2) A statement of intent is also required because authority is granted to the board of outfitters in 25 37-47-201 to adopt rules regulating commercial outfitting and guiding activities. When notified by the fish, 26 wildlife, and parks commission of restrictions on commercial use as a part of overall public restriction, it 27 is intended that the board of outfitters adopt rules regulating commercial outfitting and guiding activities 28 on affected waters in order to protect the resource or manage social conflicts while maintaining a diversity 29 of commercial service providers. 30 (3) Because of the potential for considerable effects on the public's recreational and commercial

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use of Montana's waters, it is intended that any rules proposed under the authority of this bill be subject
to the Montana Negotiated Rulemaking Act, 2-5-101 through 2-5-110, MCA, to ensure a consensus in the
rulemaking process when negotiated rulemaking will enhance public participation.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

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Section 1. Section 87-1-303, MCA, is amended to read:

8 **"87-1-303. Rules for use of lands and waters.** (1) The commission may adopt and enforce rules 9 governing uses of lands acquired or held under easement by the commission or lands which that it operates 10 under agreement with or in conjunction with a federal or state agency or private owner. The rules shall 11 <u>must</u> be adopted in the interest of public health, public safety, and protection of property in regulating the 12 use of these lands. All lease and easement agreements shall <u>must</u> itemize uses as listed in 87-1-209.

13 (2) The commission may adopt and enforce rules governing recreational uses of all public fishing 14 reservoirs, public lakes, rivers, and streams which that are legally accessible to the public or on reservoirs 15 and lakes which that it operates under agreement with or in conjunction with a federal or state agency or 16 private owner. These rules shall must be adopted in the interest of public health, public safety, and protection of property in regulating swimming, hunting, fishing, trapping, boating, including but not limited 17 to boating speed regulations, the operation of motor-driven boats, waterskiing, surfboarding, picnicking, 18 camping, sanitation, and use of firearms on the reservoirs, lakes, rivers, and streams or at designated areas 19 20 along the shore of the reservoirs, lakes, rivers, and streams. The commission may adopt and enforce rules 21 for all public reservoirs, public lakes, rivers, and streams to protect and preserve natural resources, preserve 22 a diversity of recreational opportunities, and minimize recreational user conflicts. Areas regulated pursuant 23 to the authority contained in this section must be areas which that are legally accessible to the public. 24 These rules Rules adopted to protect the public health are subject to review and approval by the department 25 of health and environmental sciences as to public health and sanitation before becoming effective. Copies 26 Adoption notices of the rules shall must show that endorsement."

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28 Section 2. Section 37-47-201, MCA, is amended to read:

"37-47-201. Powers and duties of board relating to outfitters and guides. The board shall:

30 (1) prepare and publish an information pamphlet which that contains the names and addresses of



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1 all licensed outfitters. This pamphlet must be available for free distribution as early as possible during each 2 calendar year but not later than the second Friday in March. The pamphlet shall must contain the names 3 and addresses of only those outfitters who have a valid license for the current license year. 4 (2) cooperate with the federal government in matters of mutual concern regarding the business of 5 outfitting and guiding in Montana; 6 (3) enforce the provisions of this chapter and rules adopted pursuant to this chapter; 7 (4) establish outfitter standards and professional guide standards; 8 (5) adopt: 9 (a) rules of procedure; 10 (b) rules to administer and enforce this chapter, including but not limited to rules prescribing all 11 requisite qualifications for licensure. These qualifications must include training, experience in activities 12 similar to the service to be provided, knowledge of rules of governmental bodies pertaining to outfitting, 13 and condition and type of gear and equipment. 14 (c) any reasonable rules, not in conflict with this chapter, necessary for safeguarding the health, safety, and welfare of those persons using the services of outfitters and for the protection of landowners, 15 16 the general public, and outfitters' employees, agents, and representatives; 17 (6) (a) adopt and enforce rules, using a negotiated rulemaking process, regulating the number of outfitters or guides who may operate on a particular body or stretch of water when the fish, wildlife, and 18 parks commission adopts rules regulating the number of recreational users on a particular body or stretch 19 20 of water based on a determination that it is necessary to: 21 (i) protect and preserve natural resources; 22 (ii) preserve a diversity of recreational opportunities; 23 (iii) minimize recreational user conflicts; or 24 (iv) protect the public health, public safety, or property; (b) provide that rules adopted under this subsection (6) ensure a diversity of commercial service 25 26 providers. (7) hold hearings and proceedings to suspend or revoke licenses of outfitters and professional 27 28 guides for due cause." 29 NEW SECTION. Section 3. Effective date. [This act] is effective on passage and approval. 30 -END-- 3 -

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STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

Fiscal Note for HB0348, as introduced

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act providing for regulation of the recreational and commercial use of Montana's public waters in certain cases by allowing the Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission and the Board of Outfitters to adopt and enforce rules to protect and preserve natural resources, preserve the diversity of recreational opportunities, minimize recreational user conflicts, or protect the public health, public safety, or property.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Guidelines will be developed to determine if an area or water way is in need of special regulation.
- 2. Water bodies meeting the guidelines developed above will be identified.
- 3. Meetings with user, public, community and/or affected groups will be held to determine the impact of proposed changes to rules and/or regulations.
- A negotiated rulemaking process will be utilized according to directions in the bill.
- 5. Rules will be promulgated and adopted with existing staff. A forum for the negotiated rulemaking to occur will be provided.
- 6. For the Board of Outfitters, the new proposal in the Executive Budget for increased FTE and state special revenue authority of about \$100,000 each year will be sufficient for ongoing work and for the proposed legislation.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There will be no fiscal impact to the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks or the Department of Commerce.

14	STATEMENT OF INTENT
15	(1) A statement of intent is required for this bill because authority is granted to the fish, wildlife,
16	and parks commission in 87-1-303 to adopt rules addressing the recreational and commercial use of
17	Montana rivers and streams. It is intended that the commission use this authority to identify public
18	reservoirs, public lakes, rivers, and streams that are in immediate or potential danger of resource
19	degradation or social conflict over recreational uses and to develop rules to reasonably control the public
20	recreational use of identified problem waters in order to protect the resource ADDRESS IMPACTS CAUSED
21	BY RECREATIONAL USERS, maintain a diversity of recreational opportunities, and resolve social conflicts.

Section 1. Section 87-1-303, MCA, is amended to read:
