Fiscal Note for HB0349, as introduced

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act creating the Future Fisheries Improvement Program; providing for the protection and enhancement of Montana fisheries by requiring enhancement of spawning streams and other habitats for the natural reproduction of fish and growth of populations of wild fish; directing a portion of state and federal fisheries money to fund the Future Fisheries Improvement Program; directing the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks to establish and administer the program; requiring the department to submit regular program progress reports to the Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission and to submit a progress report and the anticipated budget and related projections to the legislature.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The existing hatchery operations, fisheries management operations, and the capital budgets will be reduced to accommodate the redirection of fisheries funds.
- 2. Existing positions may be reclassified, redirected, or eliminated due to the creating of the Future Fisheries Improvement Program. Until the program is actually implemented, position changes can not be identified.
- 3. The fisheries capital program includes: \$344,000 for the construction of the Fish Laboratory; \$192,000 on going maintenance on all hatcheries; \$2.5 million for phase II of construction for the Blue Water Hatchery; \$200,000 for the Thompson Chain of Lakes project; and \$290,000 for river restoration. These projects may be impacted by the passage of this bill.
- 4. Revenue projections for FY96 and FY97 are based on FY94 actuals and they are as follows:

Fishing Licenses (02)	\$5,786,000
Dingel-Johnson (03)	4,055,066
River Restoration (02)	116,813
Total	\$9,957,879

5. About \$4,978,940 of the projected revenues will be available in each year of the biennium for the Future Fisheries Improvement Program.

FISCAL IMPACT:

A projected \$4,978,940 per year will be redirected to the Future Fisheries Improvement Program. The capital project proposals will be impacted by the redirection of fishery activities.

LONG-RANGE EFFECTS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

The direction of the Montana fisheries program will change with primary emphasis being on the Future Fisheries Improvement Program which will also impact the capital project budget.
