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9	WHEREAS, the Joint Oversight Committee on Children and Families, established by Chapter 301,
10	Laws of 1993 (House Bill No. 19), was recommended as a permanent study committee by the Joint Interim
11	Subcommittee on Children and Families at the conclusion of the 1991-92 interim; and
12	WHEREAS, the Joint Oversight Committee on Children and Families was assigned to study many
13	of the issues that are also designated as appropriate, ongoing study areas within this reauthorization
14	legislation; and
15	WHEREAS, the Joint Oversight Committee on Children and Families concluded its 1993-94 interim
16	study assignments by recommending numerous policy and programmatic changes that are presented in the
17	Committee's final report to the 54th Legislature.
18	THEREFORE, the Legislature of the State of Montana finds it appropriate to make permanent a Joint
19	Oversight Committee on Children and Families to continue monitoring the implementation of legislative
20	recommendations and to continue further study of emerging issues related to programs for children and
21	families in Montana.
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23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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25	<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 1. Legislative oversight committee appointment staff assistance. (1)
26	(a) There is a joint oversight committee on children and families. The oversight committee is composed of
27	eight members who are appointed as follows:
28	(i) four members of the house of representatives, not more than two of whom may be from one
29	political party, appointed by the speaker of the house; and
30	(ii) four members of the senate, not more than two of whom may be from one political party,

- (b) The members appointed under subsection (1)(a) must include representatives from the house appropriations subcommittee on human services and aging and the senate finance and claims subcommittee on human services and aging.
 - (2) In case of a vacancy, a replacement must be selected in the manner of the original appointment.
- (3) Members are entitled to salary and expenses as provided in 5-2-302.
- (4) The oversight committee may request staff assistance from the legislative council, which assistance may be provided within limits established by the legislative council, given other priorities and responsibilities.
- (5) Each state agency that provides services or funding for a program or service for children and families shall provide assistance and information upon request of the oversight committee.

- NEW SECTION. Section 2. Duties of oversight committee. The joint oversight committee on children and families shall:
- (1) examine public and private programs, services, and planning for children and families for the purpose of identifying duplications, inefficiencies, and any unmet needs within those programs, services, and plans;
 - (2) review federal, state, local, and private funds available to state and local jurisdictions for programs and services for children and families and consider feasible methods of refinancing those resources to maximize overall funding for existing and new programs;
 - (3) monitor interagency coordination of programs and services for children and families and study ways to improve coordination and collaboration among public and private human service providers at all levels of government in Montana;
 - (4) study the issues surrounding teenage parents and their families, including problems related to employment, education, parenting skills, and public assistance:
 - (5) monitor implementation of state and national welfare reforms related to at-risk families, child care, teenage parents, and other human service concerns;
 - (6) continue to study issues related to adult protective services; and
- (7) report the results of its study in writing to each regular session of the legislature. The oversight committee shall also provide copies of its report to the governor and appropriate state agencies.



1	NEW SECTION. Section 3. Appropriation. There is appropriated \$12,000 from the general fund

STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

Fiscal Note for HB0578, as introduced

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

A bill making permanent the Joint Oversight Committee on Children and Families; appropriating funds for use by the oversight committee.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The Joint Oversight Committee on Children and Families will conduct six one-day meetings in Helena between July 1, 1995 and July 1, 1997.
- 2. The expenses of committee members will be reimbursed as allowed in 5-2-302, MCA.
- 3. Notwithstanding the considerations expressed in assumption #5, the estimated total costs for the 1997 biennium assuming that all members attend all meetings and including legislator salaries, mileage, per diem, contracted services, printing, postage, and miscellany for the committee is approximately \$16,966 (\$4,461 personal services for legislators; \$12,505 operating expenses). This is more than the \$12,000 biennial general fund appropriation contained in the bill.
- 4. The 1995 biennium expenses of this committee are \$9,136, including \$3,166 for personal services and \$5,970 for operating expenses. The 1995 biennium budget for the committee is \$10,000. According to the Legislative Council staff, not all committee members attended every meeting and no contracted services expenses were incurred other than for printing.
- 5. If the members of the Legislative Council choose to displace other assigned work and assign existing staff to support the committee, no additional costs would be anticipated. However, if other work assigned to the Legislative Council maximally utilizes staff resources, additional staff resources would have to be procured. In the latter instance, it is anticipated that the resources could be procured either through contracted services or by the temporary (18-months) employment of an entry level legislative researcher, including incidental expenses associated with the employee. Either option is estimated to require an additional appropriation of approximately \$50,000 above the \$12,000 appropriated in the bill.
- 6. The Department of Family Services will provide information and assistance to the committee within its present law base budget.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Expenditures:

A \$12,000 appropriation is authorized in section 3 of the bill.

LONG-RANGE EFFECTS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Expenses associated with the committee will continue each biennium. The expenses will change over time as salary, mileage, and per diem rates change.
