House JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 1 INTRODUCED BY Gurlus Crimer Dewy Brainard ORR 2 3 A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF 4 5 MONTANA URGING THAT THE NORTHERN REGION FOREST SERVICE REGIONAL OFFICE REMAIN IN 6 MISSOULA; OPPOSING RESTRUCTURING THAT WOULD MOVE THE OFFICE OUT OF MISSOULA; URGING 7 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN FOREST SERVICE RESTRUCTURING DECISIONS AND SUPPORTING 8 MEANINGFUL FEDERAL AGENCY RESTRUCTURING. 9 10 WHEREAS, the vital role of our nation's forests was officially recognized in 1891 when the first 11 federal forest reserves were set aside by Congress and the forerunner of the national forest system was 12 established; and 13 WHEREAS, the people of Montana have long enjoyed both tangible and intangible benefits from the 14 presence and management activities of the United States Forest Service, which is distinct from most federal 15 and other governmental agencies in the strength and diversity of land management and traditions; and 16 WHEREAS, the United States Forest Service has recently proposed a restructuring that would close 17 its Missoula Regional Office and relocate the office's decisionmaking authority and personnel to Denver; 18 and 19 WHEREAS, Missoula is at the heart of the Forest Service Northern Region, which encompasses 15 national forests, 4 national grasslands, and 28 million acres of forest, including 5 million acres of classified 20 21 wilderness; has been the center for the forest industry for over a century; and is the site of the University 22 of Montana School of Forestry and the center of forestry activities of the Montana Department of State 23 Lands: and 24 WHEREAS, forestry research programs at the University of Montana and elsewhere in the Northern 25 Rocky Mountains would likely suffer from the proposed restructuring; and WHEREAS, the effects of the Forest Service proposal would include the loss of Montana-based 26 27 decisionmaking authority over Montana national forests to a geographically remote, ecologically unrelated 28 urban area as well as the loss of high-level, professional, skilled Forest Service employees, to the economic 29 detriment of western Montana; and



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INTRODUCED BILL

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WHEREAS, the proposed consolidation of Forest Service activity in the Denver urban area appears to violate the letter and spirit of the federal Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974, specifically 16 U.S.C. 1609, which requires that the Forest Service give priority to locating regional offices in rural areas and towns near the national forests in order to provide the optimum level of convenient, useful services to the public; and

WHEREAS, amid current controversy surrounding forest management activities, there is a broad public recognition of the need for continuing dialogue between all segments of the public and public agencies, including the Forest Service.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

That the Northern Region Forest Service Regional Office be retained in Missoula, Montana, and that the office continue to oversee the management of the national forests and grasslands of the Northern Region.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Montana Legislature urge the Montana Congressional Delegation's continued strong opposition to any proposed Forest Service restructuring likely to close or reduce the decisionmaking authority and capability of the Missoula Regional Office.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the United States Department of Agriculture and the United States Forest Service be encouraged to discontinue implementing the proposed restructuring plan and concentrate their efforts on more direct ways of reducing costs and staffing within the current Forest Service structure.

- (2) adherence to all laws applicable to the management of national forest resources; and
