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8	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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10	Section 1. Section 13-37-226, MCA, is amended to read:
11	"13-37-226. Time for filing reports. (1) Candidates for a state office filled by a statewide vote of
12	all the electors of Montana and political committees that are organized to support or oppose a particular
13	statewide candidate shall file reports:
14	(a) quarterly, due on the fifth day following a calendar quarter, beginning with the calendar quarter
15	in which funds are received or expended during the year or years prior to the election year that the
16	candidate expects to be on the ballot;
17	(b) on the 10th day of March and September in each year that an election is to be held and on the
18	15th and 5th days preceding the date on which an election is held and within 24 hours after receiving a
19	contribution of \$500 or more if received between the 10th day before and the day of the election;
20	(c) not more than 20 days after the date of the election; and
21	(d) on the 10th day of March and September of each year following an election until the candidate
2 2	or political committee files a closing report as specified in 13-37-228(3).
23	(2) Political committees organized to support or oppose a particular statewide ballot issue shall file
24	reports:
25	(a) quarterly, due on the fifth day following a calendar quarter, beginning with the calendar quarter

27	subject to a referendum is or is expected to be on the ballot;

For the purpose of reporting, a political party 20 committee is an independent committee. An independent committee shall file reports: 21 (a) reports on the 12th day preceding the date of an election in which it participates by making an 22 expenditure; 23 (b) reports not more than 20 days after the date of the election in which it participates by making 24 an expenditure; and 25 (c) a closing report at the close of each calendar year, on a date to be prescribed by the 26 commissioner. 27 (6) The commissioner may promulgate rules regarding the extent to which organizations that are 28 not primary political committees but are incidental political committees shall report their politically related 29 activities in accordance with this chapter.

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Fiscal Note for SB0072, as introduced

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

Increases the number of required campaign finance reports that must be filed by candidates for state district office.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The bill will require state district candidates to file three additional reports during the election cycle in addition to the four currently required by statute. Present law requires that state district candidates file pre-primary, postprimary, pre-general and post-general reports. (The post-general report may also be the closing report, if all campaign debts are paid.)
- 2. The required reports for state district candidates will almost double. Present law requires that reports be reviewed within ten days of receipt of each report. Public interest in these financial reports generates many telephone requests, walk-ins, copying and faxing; press and media interest also generate additional activity.
- 3. It is estimated that 1,200 additional reports will be filed with the Commissioner of Political Practices each state district election cycle and the average review and follow-up workload is two hours per report (1,200 X 2 = 2,400 hours). The hours for 1.00 FTE are approximately 2,080 per year. It is estimated that the 1.15 (2,400/2,080) additional Grade 11 FTE will be required during the 1997 biennium and that the position will be filled during May, 1996, for start-up and training purposes.
