### STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

Fiscal Note for HB0174, as introduced

### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

The bill expands the eligibility for membership in the existing Game Wardens' Retirement System (GWRS) to other state employees who are peace officers or who have state law enforcement responsibilities. Affected persons employed on June 30,1997, will be able to elect whether they will stay in the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) or join GWRS; persons hired into eligible positions on or after July 1, 1997, will be required to be members of the GWRS. Persons transferring from PERS to GWRS may remain inactive members of PERS and draw two separate retirement benefits upon termination from state service or may elect to qualify their previous PERS service into GWRS by paying the actuarial cost of transferring the service.

### ASSUMPTIONS:

Public Employees' Retirement Division (PERD):

- Only those PERS members who will be expected to work at least another five years or who will receive a higher retirement benefit in GWRS will elect to transfer into the GWRS. It is assumed that in most agencies no more than 25% of persons potentially affected by the bill will actually elect to transfer to GWRS.
- 2. Those eligible PERS members who do elect membership in GWRS will become members of the GWRS effective October 1, 1997 (average date for election during the first year of eligibility).
- 3. The fiscal impact to state agencies during the next biennium will be the difference between the PERS employer contribution rate and the GWRS employer contribution rate applied to the salaries of those employees who actually become members of the GWRS during the next biennium. The difference in employer contribution rates is: (GWRS) 8.15 - 6.70 (PERS) = 1.45 percent of covered salaries during the period after joining GWRS.
- 4. The Public Employees' Retirement Board will provide educational information and group and individual counseling to PERS members who will have the option to change systems. The cost of printed materials, travel, postage, and other operating expenses associated with this effort are estimated to be \$25,000 in fiscal year 1998.

#### Department of Corrections:

- 5. The department currently has 98 grade 10 correctional officers, 168 grade 11 correctional officers, 39 grade 13 correctional officers, two wardens, four deputy wardens, 91 grade 14 probation and parole officers, 11 grade 16 probation and parole officers, and five grade 18 probation and parole officers (418.00 FTE). 25 percent of the 418.00 FTE amounts to 104.50 FTE.
- 6. The average salary base used to calculate the estimated cost of the increased contributions varies according to the respective grades. For example, the average salary for grade 10 and grade 11 positions is the midpoint between entry and market salary; the market salary is used for the grade 13 positions because these FTE typically have been working in the positions for a longer time period.

### Department of Transportation:

- 7. Total salaries in the Governor's Executive Budget for the Enforcement Bureau are \$2,389,346 in fiscal year 1998 and \$2,396,289 in fiscal year 1999.
- 8. The initial indication is that 43.5 percent of the Enforcement Bureau employees (40 of 92) would transfer from PERS to GWRS.
- 9. The employer contribution amount will increase incrementally over time as longertenured officers currently enrolled in PERS leave employment and are replaced by newly-hired officers required to be enrolled in GWRS. The average annual turnover rate is estimated to be 9 percent.

10. The contribution increase is estimated to be \$15,071 in fiscal year 1998 (\$2,389,346 x 0.435 x 0.0145) and \$16,475 in fiscal year 1999 (\$2,396,289 x 0.435 x 1.09 x 0.0145).

Department of Livestock:

11. It is assumed that 16.00 FTE stock inspectors with seven years of service or less would consider the system transfer to be beneficial. It is estimated that the total salaries for these 16.00 FTE will be \$480,000 for fiscal years 1998 and 1999.

### Department of Justice:

- 12. There are 10.00 FTE eligible for the transfer in the Motor Vehicle Inspection Bureau. It is estimated that 25 percent of these FTE, rounded up to 3.00 FTE, would opt to make the transfer.
- 13. The estimated annual salaries for the 10.00 FTE is \$262,995. The estimated annual increase in contributions is \$1,144 (\$262,995 x 30 percent x 1.45 percent).

Department of Commerce:

- 14. The Weights and Measures Bureau has 10.00 FTE eligible for transfer. It is estimated that 25 percent, or 2.50 FTE, rounded up to 3.00 FTE, would opt to make the transfer. The total estimated annual salaries for the 10.00 FTE is \$255,000.
- 15. The estimated increase in annual contributions is \$1,109 (\$255,000 x 30 percent x 1.45 percent).

Department of Public Service Regulation:

15. There are 2.00 FTE Public Service Commission enforcement officers who may elect to become members of GWRS at an annual increased cost of \$674.

Department of Fish, Wildlife, and Parks:

16. There is no fiscal impact to the department.

### STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

### Fiscal Note for <u>HB0174</u>, second reading

### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act expanding the Game Wardens' Retirement System (GWRS) to be a Game Wardens' and Peace Officers' Retirement System (GWPORS) for state peace officers.

### ASSUMPTIONS:

Public Employees' Retirement Division (PERD):

- 1. Only those PERS members who will be expected to work at least another five years or who will receive a higher retirement benefit in GWPORS will elect to transfer into the GWPORS. It is assumed that in most agencies no more than 25 percent of persons potentially affected by the bill will actually elect to transfer to GWPORS.
- 2. Those eligible PERS members who do elect membership in GWPORS will become members of the GWPORS effective October 1, 1997 (average date for election during the first year of eligibility).
- 3. The fiscal impact to state agencies during the next biennium will be the difference between the PERS employer contribution rate and the GWPORS employer contribution rate applied to the salaries of those employees who actually become members of the GWPORS during the next biennium. The difference in employer contribution rates is: 8.15 (GWPORS) - 6.70 (PERS) = 1.45 percent of covered salaries during the period after joining GWPORS.
- 4. The Public Employees' Retirement Board will provide educational information and group and individual counseling to PERS members who will have the option to change systems. The cost of printed materials, travel, postage, and other operating expenses associated with this effort are estimated to be \$25,000 in fiscal year 1998.

### Department of Corrections:

- 5. The department currently has 98.00 FTE grade 10 correctional officers, 168.00 grade 11 correctional officers, 39.00 grade 13 correctional officers, 2.00 wardens, 4.00 deputy wardens, 91.00 grade 14 probation and parole officers, 11.00 grade 16 probation and parole officers, 5.00 grade 18 probation and parole officers, 10.50 grade 12 drill instructors, 2.00 grade 14 drill instructors, 1.00 grade 13 drill instuctor, and 1.00 grade 15 drill instructor (432.50 FTE). It is assumed that 25 percent of the 432.50 FTE, or 108.125 FTE, will elect to transfer to the GWPORS.
- 6. The average salary base used to calculate the estimated cost of the increased contributions varies according to the respective grades. For example, the average salary for grade 10 and grade 11 positions is the midpoint between entry and market salary; the market salary is used for the grade 13 positions because these FTE typically have been working in the positions for a longer time period.

Department of Transportation:

- 7. Total salaries in the Governor's Executive Budget for the Enforcement Bureau are \$2,389,346 in fiscal year 1998 and \$2,396,289 in fiscal year 1999.
- 8. The initial indication is that 43.5 percent of the Enforcement Bureau employees (40 of 92) would transfer from PERS to GWPORS.
- 9. The employer contribution amount will increase incrementally over time as longertenured officers currently enrolled in PERS leave employment and are replaced by newly-hired officers required to be enrolled in GWPORS. The average annual turnover rate is estimated to be 9 percent.

10. The contribution increase is estimated to be \$15,071 in fiscal year 1998 (\$2,389,346 x 0.435 x 0.0145) and \$16,475 in fiscal year 1999 (\$2,396,289 x 0.435 x 1.09 x 0.0145).

Department of Livestock:

11. It is assumed that 16.00 FTE stock inspectors with seven years of service or less would consider the system transfer to be beneficial. It is estimated that the total salaries for these 16.00 FTE will be \$480,000 for fiscal years 1998 and 1999.

Department of Justice:

- 12. There are 10.00 FTE eligible for the transfer in the Motor Vehicle Inspection Bureau. It is estimated that 25 percent of these FTE, rounded up to 3.00 FTE, would opt to make the transfer.
- 13. The estimated annual salaries for the 10.00 FTE is \$262,995. The estimated annual increase in contributions is \$1,144 (\$262,995 x 30 percent x 1.45 percent).

Department of Fish, Wildlife, and Parks:

14. There is no fiscal impact to the department.

1 The examination must be made by a physician or surgeon at the recipient's place of residence or at another 2 place mutually agreed on, at the board's expense. Upon the basis of the examination, the board shall 3 determine, by reason of physical or mental capacity, whether the recipient can perform the essential 4 elements of the position held by the recipient when the recipient retired. If the board determines that the 5 recipient is not incapacitated, the recipient's disability retirement benefit must be canceled when the 6 recipient is offered a position under subsection (3). If the recipient refuses to submit to a medical 7 examination, the recipient's disability retirement benefit must be canceled when the recipient is notified of 8 the determination of the board.

9 (2) If the board determines that a recipient of a disability retirement benefit should no longer be 10 subject to medical review, the board may grant a service retirement status to the recipient without 11 recalculating the recipient's monthly benefit. The board shall notify the recipient in writing as to the change 12 in status. If the recipient disagrees with the board's determination, the recipient may request the board to 13 reconsider its action. The request for reconsideration must be made in writing within 60 days after receipt 14 of the notice of the status change.

15 (3) A recipient whose disability retirement benefit is canceled because the board has determined 16 that the recipient is no longer incapacitated must be reinstated to the position held by the recipient 17 immediately before the recipient's retirement or to a position in the same classification within the recipient's 18 capacity, whichever is first open. The fact that the recipient was retired for disability may not prejudice any 19 right to reinstatement to duty that the recipient may have or claim to have.

(4) The department of fish, wildlife, and parks member's former employer may request a medical
or psychological review as to the ability of the recipient to return to work as a game warden peace officer.
If the board's findings are upheld, the department of fish, wildlife, and parks former employer shall pay the
cost of the review."

Section 10. Section 19-8-902, MCA, is amended to read:

26 "19-8-902. Qualification of other Montana public service. (1) (a) A member may, at any time 27 before retirement, make a written election with the board to qualify all or any portion of the member's 28 service credit in the public employees', highway patrol officers', firefighters' unified, sheriffs', or municipal 29 police officers' retirement system for which the member either has received or is eligible to receive a refund 30 of the member's accumulated contributions. To qualify this service, the member shall contribute to the

pension trust fund the actuarial cost of granting the service in the game wardens' <u>and peace officers'</u> retirement system, as determined by the board, based on the most recent actuarial valuation of the system minus the employer contribution provided in subsection (1)(b). This service may not be credited in more than one retirement system under Title 19.

5 (b) Upon receiving the member's payment under subsection (1)(a), the division shall transfer from 6 the member's former retirement system to the game wardens' <u>and peace officers'</u> retirement system an 7 amount equal to the employer contributions made during the member's service but no more than an amount 8 equal to the normal contribution rate minus the employee contribution rate in the game wardens' <u>and peace</u> 9 <u>officers'</u> retirement system, according to the most recent actuarial valuation, based on the salaries earned 10 by the employee as a member of the former system.

(2) (a) A member may, at any time before retirement, make a written election with the board to
qualify any full-time public service employment performed for the state or a political subdivision of the state.
The member shall provide salary and employment documentation certified by the member's public employer.
The board shall grant service credit subject to rules adopted by the board upon contribution by the
employee of the actuarial cost of granting this service in the game wardens' <u>and peace officers'</u> retirement
system, as determined by the board, based on the most recent actuarial valuation of the system.

(b) The board is the sole authority under this subsection (2) in determining what constitutes
full-time public service.
