## STATE OF MONTANA - FISCAL NOTE

Fiscal Note for HB0260, as introduced

#### DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

An act statutorily creating the Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Commission; providing for the membership of the commission; describing the purpose and duties of the commission; assigning the commission to the Office of the Governor for administrative purposes; and providing for the initial appointments to the commission.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. This commission was established by executive order during fiscal year 1996 and is administratively attached to the Office of Community Services in the Department of Labor and Industry. The Governor's Executive Budget includes \$1,500 each year of the 1999 biennium in general fund authority for expenses in support of the commission. The bill attaches the commission to the Governor's Office for administrative purposes, but it is assumed that the commission will be assigned to the Office of Community Services and that the proposed authority in the Executive Budget will cover the minimum operating expenses.
- 2. In the event that the bill creates a commission attached to the Governor's Office that is operated differently than the existing commission and that is not assigned to the Office of Community Services, there will be increased costs to the Governor's Office. The estimated increased costs would include 0.50 FTE grade 13 to staff the commission, per diem and travel reimbursement estimated to be \$3,000 per year, training, resource library development, office rent, telephone, and annual report costs of approximately \$14,700 per year, and one-time equipment and furniture expenses of \$4,000. The total estimates are \$33,400 in fiscal 1998 and \$29,400 in fiscal 1999 in general fund authority.
