16	WHEREAS, the current primary process is relatively recent in our nation's history, existing since
17	1972, and prior to the creation of "Super Tuesday", there have been many historic attempts at developing
18	regional primaries; and
19	WHEREAS, a proposal is being forwarded by the Council of State Governments West and the
20	Western Governors' Association for a coordinated candidate forum and state-optional Rocky Mountain
21	Presidential Primary.
