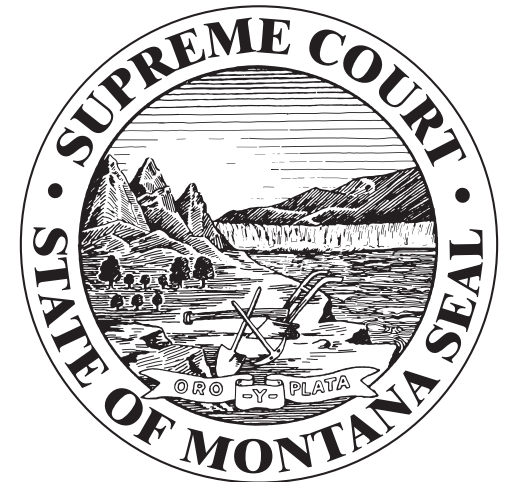

COURT HELP PROGRAM

Assisting Self Represented Litigants with Access to Montana Legal Resources and Information.



The Court Help Program is an initiative of the Montana Supreme Court designed to assist people with civil (non-criminal) legal problems.

The Court Help Program cannot give you legal advice or represent you in court. The goal of the program is to provide the information you need to understand your legal rights and responsibilities and to help you resolve legal problems on your own. Self Help Law Centers are located throughout the state to provide you with information and direct you to resources that will help you help yourself.

Self Help Law Centers CAN:

- Give you information on Dissolution of Marriage (Divorce), Parenting Plans (Custody), Consumer Credit, Guardianship of a Minor, Step-parent adoption, Landlord or Tenant, Name change...and much more!
- Answer general questions about how the court works
- Tell you how to find state laws and regulations
- Review your forms for errors like missing signatures or pages

Self Help Law Centers CANNOT:

- Give you legal advice
- Explain a judicial decision
- Refer you to a specific lawyer
- Interpret the law or legal terms for you
- Tell you which laws apply to the specific facts of your case
- Fill out or correct forms for you
- Assist in criminal matters
