

MINUTES OF THE MEETING
LONG-RANGE PLANNING SUBCOMMITTEE
MONTANA STATE
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

February 5, 1985

The meeting of the Long-Range Planning Subcommittee was called to order by Chairman Robert Thoft on February 5, 1985 at 8:06 a.m. in Room 420 of the State Capitol.

ROLL CALL: All members were present.

DEPARTMENT OF FISH, WILDLIFE AND PARKS, CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

James Flynn (40:B:023), Director, Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FW&P) said he wanted to call the committee's attention to new cost estimates on the Miles City fish hatchery. The cost estimate Mr. Flynn gave the committee yesterday (\$4.4 million) has been updated and the cost of the project is now \$4.9 million. He said the two regional headquarters were also reestimated and their costs have gone from \$2,465,500 to \$2,575,300.

Representative Bardanouve (40:B:041) asked if the Miles City hatchery is still more economical than the facility at Fort Peck. Mr. Flynn said yes. He said the cost of the Fort Peck facility will also increase and will still be a more expensive facility to build. He said the department will also have to purchase land for the Fort Peck facility and it does not need to at Miles City.

Mr. Flynn (40:B:068) gave committee members information on hunting and license fee increases over the last five fiscal years (EXHIBIT 1). Chairman Thoft (40:B:72) asked if any FW&P projects will be jeopardized if the \$1.00 fee increase for fishing licenses does not pass. Mr. Flynn said the department can still fund these projects either by extending the bonding program from 5 to 7 years, or by taking the new headquarters facilities out of the cash program and putting them into the bonding program. Mr. Flynn said if the department has to do either of the above options, then they will still need to come back to the 1987 Legislature with a proposal for a fee increase.

Representative Bardanouve (40:B:104) asked if the exhibit has a typo for deer license fees. Mr. Flynn said the resident deer license was raised to \$8.00 in 1982 and it is still \$8.00. Chairman Thoft said if the \$1.00 increase is passed, then resident fishing licenses will go from \$8.00 to \$9.00. Mr. Flynn said yes and

nonresident season permits from \$30.00 to \$35.00 and the nonresident 2 day permit from \$6.00 to \$8.00. He said the nonresident combination license will go from \$300.00 to \$350.00. Senator Fuller asked how much is a resident bird license. Mr. Flynn said \$6.00.

Chairman Thoft (40:B:132) asked for information concerning the Glenn Lake Park acquisition in the 1983 Session.

Makoshika State Park Road Improvements, Glendive: Mr. Flynn (40:B:144) said the project will provide for paving of the rest of the road in Makoshika State Park. The road has been an ongoing problem for the department. The paving will cost \$290,000 and the money is to come from the Legacy Program. Representative Bardanouve (40:B:161) asked if the road problem will be corrected with these funds. He wondered if the problem with the road is due to sloughing of the ground beneath it. Don Hyyppa, Administrator, Parks Division, FW&P said this project will not do stabilizing work on the hill the road crosses. The hill is not sloughing now it has been stabilized and paved. These funds are for pavement of a road in the canyon where a sloughing problem does not exist.

Chairman Thoft (40:B:194) asked if the funding for this project will come from the Legacy Program. Mr. Hyyppa said the money will come from the Legacy Program and is transferred to the department's earned income account (State Park Fees). Mr. Flynn said originally the department was going to use Resource Indemnity Trust funds which have now been incorporated into the Legacy Program. Chairman Thoft asked if this project made the cut in the Governor's Legacy Program. Mr. Hyyppa said he did not know. Later Chairman Thoft (40:B:267) said this project did not make the Legacy Program cut.

Spring Meadow Lake Improvements, Helena: Mr. Flynn (40:B:240) described the project to the committee. The money will be used to further develop Spring Meadow Lake Park with beaches, docks, shelters, tables, garbage cans and lawns. The project will cost \$125,000 and \$62,500 will come from Coal Tax monies and \$62,500 from the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF).

Senator Van Valkenburg (40:B:277) asked if the \$125,000 is all the department has in mind for capital improvements to Spring Meadow Lake. Mr. Flynn said yes, this money plus some from the last session will accomplish the improvements the department has in mind.

Senator Fuller (40:B:285) asked Joan Poston to explain what the community has done to Spring Meadow Lake Park. Mrs. Poston (40:B:290) said a local citizens committee raised \$10,000 last year and built a trail in the park with volunteer labor. She said the trail was built under the supervision of FW&P. She said the area is very popular and 60,000 people used the park last year. She said the park really needs restroom facilities.

Senator Van Valkenburg (40:B:323) asked how much coal trust money is available to FW&P this biennium. Mr. Flynn said the revenue estimate is \$2.3 million, however, this estimate will be reduced by \$600,000 which is for capital improvements incurred this biennium and carried over into the next biennium. \$1.7 million will be available for the 1986-87 biennium. Senator Van Valkenburg asked if the department already has authorization for the expenditure of \$600,000. Mr. Flynn said yes they received the authorization before, but the revenue was not available at that time. Senator Fuller asked if the authorization came from Coal Tax money in House Bill 2. Mr. Hyyppa said the \$600,000 was authorized last session and none of the projects Mr. Flynn has mentioned deal with House Bill 2.

Representative Bardanouve (40:B:367) said that if House Bill 19 passes the Coal Tax Trust will be reduced by \$620,000 or \$625,000. Senator Van Valkenburg asked where House Bill 19 is now. Representative Bardanouve said it is in the Highways Committee. Madalyn Quinlan, Staff Analyst, Legislative Fiscal Analyst Office said House Bill 19 will effect the Park Acquisition Trust and the interest on the trust which goes 2/3 to FW&P and 1/3 to Cultural and Aesthetics. Mr. Flynn said the bill will reduce the interest the department gets from the trust. The interest will be reduced by \$70,000 to \$80,000 if this bill passes.

Les Mason State Recreation Area, Whitefish: Mr. Flynn (40:B:431) said this project will cost \$360,000, \$180,000 from Coal Tax funds and \$180,000 from LWCF. The project will develop the area by providing for roads, parking, footpaths, shelters, tables, benches and swimming docks.

Glen Lake State Recreation Area, Bozeman: Mr. Flynn (40:B:463) said this site was purchases in the 1983 Session. He said the department wants to haul in top soil and plant grass over the old city dump. Monitoring wells will be installed as recommended by the Department of Health. The funds will also begin the

public planning process so that the public can voice what it wants in the way of park development. The total cost of the project is \$165,000. \$82,500 will come from Coal Tax monies and \$82,500 from LWCF.

Chairman Thoft (40:B:483) asked if the dirt hauled in will be placed on leased or owned property. Mr. Hyyppa said the dirt will be placed on leased land and the department has authority to improve leased land. Chairman Thoft asked if the improvements to the dump are necessary to have a recreational site at Glen Lake. Mr. Hyyppa said excluding the dump will bisect the area and will sever the pond from the East Gallatin River which is a very attractive part of the area. Representative Bardanouve (40:B:501) said he is disappointed when he hears that the Legislature bought a city dump. Chairman Thoft said the project is being planned around a city dump. Mr. Hyyppa said it is less expensive to develop this area than to purchase another site.

Representative Ernst (40:B:556) said he is concerned about covering hazardous wastes in the dump. Mr. Hyyppa said all testing shows that lead concentrations are far below levels of concern and by monitoring the pond, creek and fish the department will be able to determine if levels become too high. If a problem develops it may be cleaned up or the area abandoned. The lease agreement states that the city of Bozeman is responsible for any cleanup activities. Representative Ernst (40:B:615) asked if there are any Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) reports on the site. Mr. Hyyppa said EPA and the State Solid Waste Bureau recommend the proposal before the committee. Representative Ernst (40:B:641) asked if the department is responsible for the cost of continued testing. Mr. Hyyppa said yes. Mr. Flynn said the department will gather more information on the tests done at the site for the committee.

Elkhorn State Monument Improvements, Boulder: Mr. Flynn (40:B:695) said this project is for parking and signs needed at the ghost town of Elkhorn. This project will cost \$5,000 from the Legacy Program.

Lake Elmo State Recreation Area, Billings: Mr. Flynn (41:A:014) said the department has a two phase acquisition for Lake Elmo. The first phase was acquired at the end of the 1983 Session. The second phase, for 42 acres, must be acquired prior to July 14, 1987 at a cost of \$600,000. The department is proposing to present this acquisition to the 1987 Legislature.

This project (done on Phase I) will cost \$24,000, \$12,000 from Coal Tax revenues and \$12,000 from private revenue sources. The money will be used to riprap a section of the lake bank, build an entry road and develop parking areas.

Representative Ernst asked if FW&P personnel do these smaller projects or if they are contracted out. Mr. Hyyppa said a project like this will be contracted out and donated help used.

Representative Bardanouve (41:A:046) said some people have approached him with their concerns about the purchase of the second part of Lake Elmo. Mr. Hyyppa said Mr. Kimble the owner of the property is concerned that the state should exercise its option to buy the second phase or at least commit itself to the purchase of Phase II. Mr. Kimble would like to develop the land for a subdivision if the state does not purchase it. A metro sewer system is going through near the property and he will have it installed if the state is not going to buy the land. He said Mr. Kimble is now aware that the land has appreciated and is worth more than the state is willing to pay. The department has been working with the Nature Conservancy and Billings banks to see if they might exercise the department's option now. If these institutions are willing to do this, Mr. Kimble will have to accept less than \$600,000 for the property because part of the money will be needed to pay the interest on the loan. The department feels they have a binding agreement with Mr. Kimble now and the purchase does not have to be made until 1987.

Representative Bardanouve (41:A:83) asked why the value of the land has increased. Mr. Hyyppa said the 42 acres left to purchase has appreciated in value because once the metro sewer system goes through this area it will be subdividable. Mr. Hyyppa said he thinks history will show Lake Elmo to be the most valuable purchase made with Coal Tax funds.

Rosebud State Recreation Area, Forsyth: Mr. Flynn (41:A:116) said this project is for a state recreation area located near Forsyth. The project will cost \$105,000 and the money will come from the Legacy Trust Fund. The project funds will be used for riprap along the banks, constructing footpaths, resurfacing roads, constructing boat ramps and improving the water system at the site. Mr. Flynn said the area gets a quite a lot of use during the year.

Fishing Access Acquisitions, Statewide: Mr. Flynn (41:A:147) said funds for this project will come from

the \$1.00 which is set aside from fishing license fees for the acquisition, operation, development and maintenance of fishing sites. He said the department estimates \$600,000 is needed for acquisition of sites and maintenance of current sites. Mr. Flynn said the department is currently considering buying 58 different fishing sites. Only 8 of these are being considered seriously.

Senator Van Valkenburg (41:A:180) asked the department to bring a map which shows fishing access sites in Montana. He also asked how much money was available last session for fishing access acquisition. Mr. Hyppa said it was \$740,000 to \$745,000 and the department purchased 18 sites with this money. Senator Van Valkenburg asked how many sites the department plans on acquiring with \$600,000. Mr. Hyppa said it is difficult to determine how many will be purchased because the department does not know when they will become available.

Mr. Flynn said the entire \$600,000 will not be used for acquisition because funding of operation and maintenance of sites will be taken out first.

Yellow Bay State Recreation Area, Flathead Lake: Mr. Flynn (41:A:228) said this recreational area neighbors the Biological Station for the University of Montana. Park users are getting into the experiment station and causing problems. The \$10,000 of Legacy Trust funds will be used to construct a fence to keep the public out of the experiment station.

Jack Standford (41:A:248), Director of the biological station spoke as a proponent of the project and submitted written testimony (EXHIBIT 2).

Representative Ernst said he would like to see this project funded if the Legacy Program falls through. Senator Van Valkenburg pointed out that this project did not make the Governor's list of recommended projects for the Legacy Program. Representative Bardanouve said the committee does not have to follow the Governor's recommendations in funding projects.

Repair Asphalt Roads, Kalispell Area: Mr. Flynn (41:A:338) said this request is for general repair of asphalt roads in six recreational areas around Kalispell and one in Whitefish. The project will cost \$200,000 and funds are to come from the Legacy Trust Fund.

Road Maintenance, Billings Area: Mr. Flynn (41:A:372) said this project is for resurfacing roads with gravel at various sites in the Billings area. The drainage in this area is poor and during wet periods damage is caused to the roads. The project cost is \$84,000 and the money will come from the Legacy Trust Fund.

Hell Creek State Recreation Area, Jordan: Mr. Flynn (41:A:391) said this site is North of Jordan on the Fort Peck Reservoir. It is the only public recreation spot in the area. It is for day use and camping. The funds will be used to improve the entrance road, beach area and to develop camping. This will cost \$75,000 and the funds are to come from the Legacy Trust Fund.

Fort Maginnis State Monument, Lewistown: Mr. Flynn (41:A:411) said Fort Maginnis is a historic site within the state park system. This request will improve and construct roads and parking at the site. It will also provide for fencing, latrines and signing for the public. The project cost is estimated to be \$35,000 and will come from the Legacy Trust Fund.

Representative Ernst (41:A:424) asked if there isn't some concern on the part of the people in the surrounding area about the use of the site. Mr. Hyyppa said the site is in a remote area and the improvements the department is proposing are minimal and should not increase the usage of the site that much. He said some local people are still concerned about increased usage of the site.

Chairman Thoft (41:A:472) asked if House Bill 2 passes if funding from it be used for Legacy Trust Fund projects. Mr. Hyyppa said yes, but he is not certain how many projects would be funded.

Deep Creek Recreation Area, Missoula: Mr. Flynn (41:A:494) said this project will establish an area at Deep Creek Canyon, for shooting, camping, fishing and day access. Mr. Flynn said he feels this is a comprehensive and worthwhile package. The department will purchase 26 acres for fishing access. Champion International will donate 10 more acres and FW&P will lease an additional 94 acres. At a later date FW&P will do a land exchange for 100 more acres. The department is asking for legislative authorization to spend federal and private funds on the project.

Lon Dale (41:A:597) spoke as a proponent of the project and submitted written testimony (EXHIBIT 3).

Chairman Thoft (41:A:659) asked who will control the shooting range. Mr. Flynn said it will be a cooperative agreement similar to the one in Hamilton.

Senator Van Valkenburg (41:A:680) asked if the \$150,000 is coming from LWCF. Mr. Flynn said no, it is Pitman-Robertson money and private funds. There is also a possibility of the National Rifle Association donating money to the project.

Boat Facilities Program, Statewide: Mr. Flynn (41:B:012) said the Dingle-Johnson excise tax on fishing equipment was recently expanded to include boat motors. Since this expansion 10% of all money received by states must be spent on improvement or development of boating facilities. This project will use \$900,000 of federal money and will be matched with state funds. Mr. Flynn gave committee members a list of the sites which are to be improved or developed (EXHIBIT 4).

Chairman Thoft (41:B:073) asked if these federal monies can be spent on projects other than boating facility improvements. Mr. Flynn said no. Chairman Thoft asked if the state matching funds (\$299,000) could be spend on other projects. Mr. Flynn said yes, but sportsmen tend to get irritated when license revenues are spent on paving roads, etc.

Representative Bardanouve (41:B:096) asked if the motor boat gas tax could be used for other projects. Mr. Hyyppa said this money is only used for maintenance of water base sites. It is legal to use it for development of new sites, but FW&P is using it in its operational budget for maintenance of existing sites.

Site Improvements, Statewide: Mr. Flynn (41:B:107) said in 1981 the Legislature established a Land Trust Fund. Income from state lands and proceeds from the sale of surplus lands are deposited in this trust. The balance of the trust is \$600,000. The department estimates interest earnings on the trust over the next biennium to be \$150,000. FW&P plans on putting this interest money back into the operation and maintenance of department properties, specifically the Mount Haggin property. The money will be used to put up interpretive signs at Mount Haggin and for construction of fencing there.

Chairman Thoft (41:B:170) asked what the status is of the Mount Haggin fencing project. Mr. Hyyppa said mostly interior fences are needed and possibly some small amounts of boundary fencing.

Representative Bardanouve (41:B:204) asked how much acreage FW&P owns at Mount Haggin. Mr. Flynn said 55,000 acres.


Senator Van Valkenburg (41:B:214) asked if trust earnings are restricted to use on income generating lands.

Mr. Flynn said the interest money is to be used for the operation, maintenance and development of department owned lands. Senator Van Valkenburg asked if this money can be used for the Yellow Bay fencing project. Mr. Flynn said yes.

Helena Headquarter Improvements: Mr. Flynn (41:B:247) said the FW&P building was completed in 1976 and since this time a considerable amount of modifications have been done to the interior of the building. These modifications have thrown the heating and cooling systems out of wack. This project will spend \$112,000 of license revenue to bring these systems up to standards.

Senator Van Valkenburg (41:B:311) said \$112,000 is a fair amount of money for improvements of this nature. Phil Hauck, Administrator, Architecture and Engineering Division, Department of Administration said the project will basically rezone the systems and additional thermostats will be installed. Senator Van Valkenburg asked Mr. Flynn if sportsmen like to see license revenues being spent in this manner. Mr. Flynn said assuming they approve of the general management of the FW&P program they would approve spending license revenues for this.

There being no further business before the subcommittee the meeting was adjourned at 10:02 a.m.


